Villa in Attitude of Rebel Dictator

El Paso, Tex., Dec. 15 .- Americans, Germans and Spaniards, who arrived from Chihuahua, Mexico, report Fran-cisco Villa, rebel leader, has virtually constituted himself dictator there and refused to heed requests of represenatives of the foreign governments. They assert the rebel leader seized \$5,000,000 worth of property belonging to foreigners and is said to have put to death twenty Mexican civilians, including Sergeic Sanchez, lawyer and former state official, and has commanded American, German and British consuls to obey re el orders.

Villa ordered the expulsion of citizens of Spain, all progressive mer-chants, on pain of death. He first informed them they must be out of the country within five days, but later after an appeal by Harry Scobell, British vice-consul, he extended the time to ten days. None of the Spanjards were allowed to take away anythings except personal effects and

were told never to return.
Otto Kueck, German consul, protested t. Villa against the exaction of tribute from Germany. Villa threatened Kueck, saying the latter would be escorted to the border if he persisted in his protest. The store in which Kueck is interested was required to pay \$30,000.

All homes and property of the ex-nelled Spaniards was appropriated to the personal use of the rebels.


