### WILL CHECK UP EXPLOSIVES

O. J. Helland of this city has been appointed by W. P. Porterfield of Washington, D. C., as intelligence officer for Williams county. His duties are to keep tab of explosives and to report any suspicious circumstances regarding purchases, to report suspicious fires and other acts that appear to be of treasonable nature. Anyone in the county who knows of large amounts of explosives purchased under conditions of a suspicious nature are asked to report the same to him. The same is asked regarding fires.

Storekeepers having explosives for sale are asked to check them up carefully every day and if any is stolen to report the same to Mr. Helland.

### THE GERMAN LOSSES

New York, May 31.—On April 27 the German general staff was not in position to give detailed information regarding the German losses in the offensive operations begun on March 21. This announcement was made in the reichstag by Gen. von Wrisberg, according to the Berlin Vorwarts, a copy of which has been received here. The number of men taken prisoner and missing in the German armies up to March 31, Gen. von Wrisberg said, was 664,104. Most of these were prisoners, there being 236,000 prisoners in France, 119,000 in England, and 157,000 in Russia and Roumania. The remainder, about 152,000 should be considered as dead.

## AMERICANS CHECK GERMANS

changing from a war of movement to a war of position.

Official reports show that the Germans are launching their assaults on Chezy, Corcy and near Domniers, isolated points of vantage. These attacks were, roughly, from five to seven miles apart along the line which includes ground where the Americans have established themselves and have fought the Germans to a standstill. The French official statement says the Teuton attacks were all repulsed.

The report of operations along the British front fails to show any notable activity on the part of the Germans. At Mereland-court, between the Ancre and the Somme, south of Albert, the Germans, supported by heavy artillery fire, attempted to raid the British positions but were repulsed, leaving prisoners behind.
