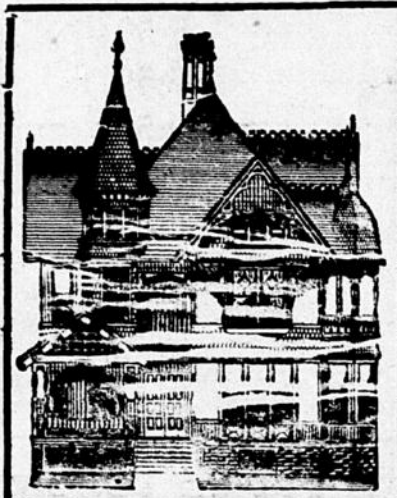

have heard nothing from her
since. Several letters which were

She may have disappeared by
