## FORMER MINOT WOMAN WAS MURDERED

Cornelia Biller Shot to Death by an Army Deserter in St. Paul Because He Believed Woman Faithless.

Cornelia Biller, a former Minot woman, was murdered by her lover, William Brinkbeck, an army deserter, who then turned the revolver on himself, his body falling across that of the woman he believed faithless. The tragedy occurred in St. Paul early Saturday in the shadow of the wall at Charles street and Pascal avenue, where for three months the couple had been meeting.

A note in Brinkbeck's pocket, hastily scrawled on a letter, read in part, "I am going to kill my only love. She did me dirt. Put me beside my mother."

Brinkbeck enlisted in the First Minnesota Field artillery a year ago last July and went to the Mexican border. It was while he was on guard at the State Capitol two months ago that he met Mrs. Biller. Three weeks ago they quarreled over other alleged suits.

Mrs. Biller first married a man named Lowry, but had divorced him and married Perry Loudon. She had separated from him and intended to get a divorce, but stopped court proceedings when she learned that he was dying at Wasau, Wis., of tuberculosis.

Brinkbeck knew these facts about his affinity, but was so infatuated that he scoffed at the advice of his brother George, a city fireman, at whose home he lived. "She's a vampire, Bill, and she'll get you," George says he warned his brother, but William continued with his love affair.

A month ago, in order that he might spend more time with his sweetheart, William deserted from the army, according to his brother. That started the quarrel between the pair.

In Brinkbeck's pocket with the note was found a gold locket bearing the initials "C. L." In it were the remains of two pictures of the murdered woman. The face had been slashed and mutilated in each and a little note—an attack on the woman in unprintable language—rested between the two destroyed photographs.

Mrs. Biller was the mother of two children, a boy and a girl, 4 and 6 years old. They are said to be on a farm with her first husband's relatives near Minot.

Grandson of Hethertons Wounded in France.

Wm. Hetherton, Sr., received a letter from his daughter who resides in Glasgow, Scotland, telling of the serious injury to her son, who has been fighting in France. The young man was struck in the back by a German shell and his bowels were perforated. It required the most skilled surgeons to attend him, but after being in the hospital for months, he is out and on the road to recovery. Another grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Hetherton's was killed while fighting in France.

The Hennessys Leave.

Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Hennessy left Minot Wednesday for Minneapolis. Mr. Hennessy has been accepted in the selective draft army and leaves for Des Moines, Ia. Mrs. Hennessy will remain with her parents in Minneapolis. Hundreds of warm friends regret to see these excellent people leave. Mr. Hennessy has held the position of credit man at the Northern States Power Co. for the past four years. He dislikes to leave Minot, but like the good "fighting Irishman" that he is, he intends to help "clean" the Kaiser in about six months, when he will return to this city.

Oliver Eckhardt Organizing Theatrical Companies in Minot.

Oliver Eckhardt, a prominent theatrical man, is in Minot organizing two road shows which will be perfected by the first of the month. Players from Chicago and other sections of the east are arriving. The Eckhardt Players will rehearse at the Grand Theatre and will open in this city. Two companies, one of which will play musical comedy, are being organized.

Mr. Eckhardt spent the past seven years in Canada playing at Edmonton, Calgary, Moosejaw and other important Canadian cities.

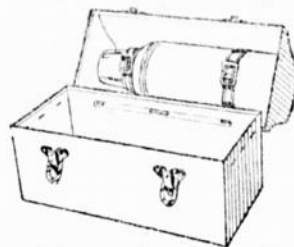

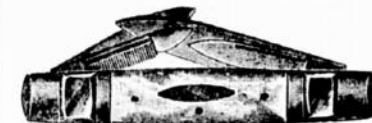
