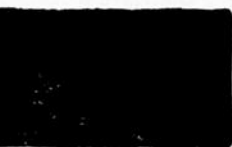

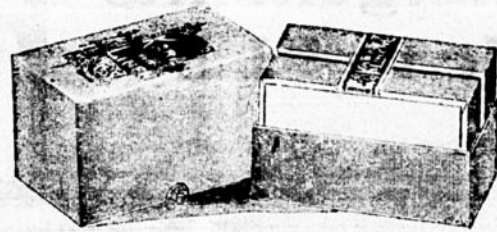

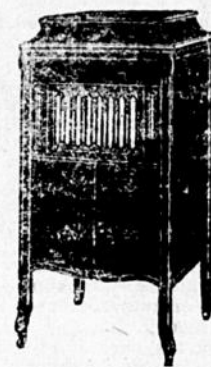

BRIEF STATE NEWS

Wow!

Little grains of powder, Little dabs of paint, Make the girly-girlies Look like what they ain't.

A free night school has been opened in the high school building at Jamestown.

Yes, the boys are coming home, from overseas. The first divisions are reported to be embarking, and others will follow in quick succession.

O. P. Helseth received a letter from John Ramsvig, Norway, Nov. 22, that was sent July 10, having been four months and 12 days on the way.

Mike Dovich writes a Makoti friend that he will send his bible to him so he can see what a narrow escape he had in a battle, in which a bullet went thru the bible which he carried in his pocket.

In the casualty list of last Sunday appears the name of Pvt. Walter N. Fry, of Stampede, N. Dak. Fry was a Company C boy and was severely wounded several months ago and his death was no doubt caused from the wounds received at that time.

Rev. Ralph Fulton, of Towner, received his call to report at New York and will leave for that place after Thanksgiving. He will have a week's training at Columbia university before going to France.

Others took turns attending Mrs.

Janssen and watching her husband, and Monday afternoon Elvin Larson and Henry Swenson hustled him into a car and took him back to Schafer, where the authorities will probably keep him until the preliminary hearing.

Mr. A. Haldi of Tatman township, recently heard from his son, Arnold, who is with the U. S. army in France, but at the time he wrote he had not been at the front. Mr. Haldi says Albert Dumond, a neighbor's boy who went at the time his son did, has been at the front and was slightly wounded, Oct. 18th.

A state roll of honor, cast in bronze and erected in a number of places in the state, as an enduring monument to the North Dakota boys who gave their lives on the battlefields of the great war, is the suggestion of Scout Sergeant Melvin D. Hildreth, son of Col. M. A. Hildreth, United States district attorney, who is serving overseas.

Robert Janss of Schafer was taken into custody last Friday by Sheriff Randall on the complaint of a neighbor charging him with cruelty to his family. Upon his arrival at Schafer he made some unsuccessful attempts to secure bondsmen, but those from this locality who were at the county seat were unwilling to take the chance.

To the astonishment of the neighborhood, Bob came home Monday evening without bonds. His return and renewed threats so affected Mrs. Jans-

sen that her recovery was considered uncertain. Mrs. Draegert and her son, Albert, who happened to come to the house just after his return, observing the condition of affairs, concluded to spend the night there.

State's Attorney Backlund and Sheriff Gullickson of Lisbon returned Saturday night from Chicago, where they had been on official business in quest of Alexander Clemjowski, alias Alexander K. Davis, of Enderlin, a fugitive from justice, wanted on the charge of bigamy. He was located at the Naval Training Station on the Great Lakes, and proper extradition papers having been secured, Sheriff Gullickson promptly brought his man back, accompanied by the state's attorney. The preliminary hearing was held Saturday before Justice Potter of Enderlin, and the defendant was bound over to district court under \$1,000 bonds. Defendant is now confined in the county jail, not having secured bail. Clemjowski's offense is a serious one. He has a lawful wife and child in Chicago, and at Enderlin there is a young woman, one of the most respected ladies of that town, who had lived with him more than a year, under the belief that she was his wife. It seems a wedding ceremony was performed in this second instance—but of course not a legal one, owing to the fact that a first wife was alive. There is also a child by this second woman. We have been requested to not publish all the names—at least not at present. Clemjowski is about 38 years of age and a barber by trade.

One Child Dead, Two Others Are Severely Burned

Mandan, N. D., Nov. 28.—It was a sad Thanksgiving day for Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Ingraham, of Sentinel Butte, N. D., whose daughter, Grace, aged 8 years, was burned to death while pinned under an overturned prairie schooner, fired by the small heating stove the family was using in its overland journey.

Two other babies were burned before the father and mother could rescue them from the blazing wagon, while five children were rescued unhurt.

The wagon was overturned on a hill when the horses became frightened.

Minot Electric Co. Files Petition in Bankruptcy
