They ought to be rounded up in the center, gradually sloping off to the sides to shed the water. It is not hard to build the roads right. Look at your roads as they are today. They lie flat and the water cannot run off in a year. They get full of ruts. Nobody drags them and you fellows depend on us from the other towns to drive over them and smooth them down after the rains.
