More Fireworks The fire works attraction proved a urprisingly great success this year. Fireworks should be shown every active night of the fair hereafter. Judging by the many inquiries heard at the recent fair the fire works will bring in the evening crowds and much more than pay for the added cost of the attraction.

Community Exhibits
Community exhibits proved a great success this year, Douglas, Velva and Van Hook and John Renz of Minot providing splendid booths that were noteworthy attractions. There is a disposition to enlarge this field next year and the fair board should foster this interest in the communities both in and outside of Ward county in

every possible manner.

State Aid Desired

A definite and sustained effort shiuld be made to obtain state aid, such as the fairs at Fargo, Grand Forks and Mandan receive. The fair for Forks and Mandan receive. The fair should be made a district fair for northwestern North Dakota, at least and the scope of its work extended in manifested in it. The state budget Clerk's Statement board meets in November and the fair board should make arrangements to go before the state board and press its claims to substantial recognition. This campaign should also be carried to Bismarck and to the state legislature at its coming session.
