An Executive Order was issued by the President on May, 7,1913, requiring competitive examinations by the Commission for the position of postmaster at all fourth-class offices at which the annual compensation is $\$ 180$ or more and at which the incumbent was not appointed under the Civil Service Regulations. Examinations under this order have been held for all the States and it is found that there are a number of offices for which no eligibles were secured. <br> 2. For such of these offices as have a compensation of as much as $\$ 500$ per annum a second examination has ben ordered py a recent Executive Order and the examinations will be held in this state on the date and places indicated below: <br> 8 These examinations are open only to persons who reside within the territory of the office at which appointment is desired and who meet the requirements of the regulations. <br> 4.
