M.A. Hoghaug Appointed Representative On National Board

M. A. Hoghaug has been made a

member of the North Dakota official committee of The Constitutional League of America. The appointment to the big organization which has as its objective, the preservation of American ideals and education of the public to the meaning of the constitution of United States, came at the hands of Governor Lynn J. Frazier. One of the first works of the organization will be an effort to get into the hands of every citizen of the United States, a copy of the national con-

M'SWEENEY IS DEAD FROM HIS HUNGER STRIKE

Irish Patriot Succumbed To Hand Of Fate

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Terrance MacSwiney died at Brixton Prison at 5:40 a. m. October 26th. The lord mayor died without regaining consciousness on the dawn of the 74th day of his hunger strike. With MacSwiney as he died were Father Dominic and his brother, John. John remained at the prison thruout the night and was not permitted to leave until 6:14. In that time he was not permitted to communicate with other relatives.

Relatives were denied admission Saturday and remained in the prison waiting room all day without food. Finally they were ejected late Saturday night.

MacSwiney, said to be suffering from lung trouble when arrested on August 12th, went on a hunger strike immediately. He was convicted August 16th by a military court on charges of preparing and having in his possession seditious literature. Eleven other Irish Republicans arrested at the same time went on a hunger strike in the Cork jail.

When MacSwiney was deported to England to be placed in Brixton jail shortly after his sentence he was so weak he had to be carried aboard the steamer. It was believed then he would die within a few weeks.

The lord mayor lived, however, with only slight changes in his condition to see another of the hunger strikers die after 68 days of fasting. He was Michael Fitzgerald.

While he lay on his cot in Brixton jail, conditions in Ireland became more acute. The government announced it would proceed vigorously against the Sinn Feiners.

Then began a period of reprisals when police exacted swift revenge for every ambush and attack by Sinn Feiners. Homes and business buildings were destroyed and Sinn Fein leaders were shot by the Black and Tans.

The attacks continued up to the assembling of Parliament, when an attempt at censure lead to a vote of confidence in the government. Since the government had announced it would not feed the hunger striking prisoners the vote of confidence made it clear MacSwiney could gain neither release nor change in Great Britain's policy toward the Sinn Feiners.

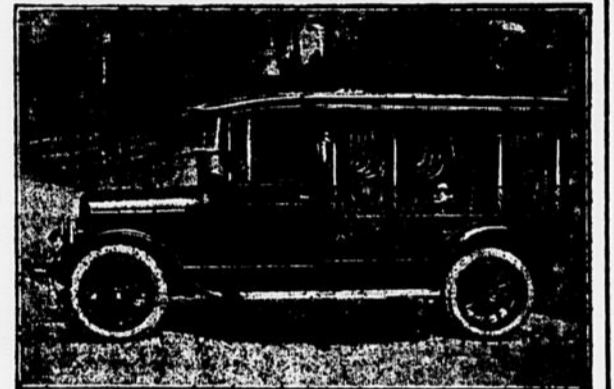
