## M'CUMBER WINS SENATE SUPPORT BONUS MAJORITY SURE

Senator Interviewed in Washington Gives Out Text of Resolution Adopted by Republican Caucus Which He Drafted and Senators Approved.

Washington, D. C., June 20.—Senator Porter J. McCumber, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, today announced that as a result of the resolution adopted by the Senate Republican caucus pledging the passage of the Soldier Bonus at this session of Congress, victory for the Senate Finance Committee "puts the party in power back of this bill."

Senate Leaders Pledged. When the Republicans gathered today to decide upon the legislative program for the remainder of the present session of Congress, Senator McCumber demanded that the Senate leaders pledge themselves by resolution to the passage of a soldiers' compensation bill before Congress adjourns. The result was very gratifying to all those who have been fighting the soldiers' battle in Washington. Immediately after the tariff bill is passed the bonus will be put before the Senate and passed.

Text of Resolution. The resolution adopted, which Senator McCumber himself wrote, reads:

"Whereas, at a conference of the Republican members of the Senate held on the 19th day of April, 1922, it was moved and carried, that it is the sense of this conference that the Senate proceed without further delay with the consideration of the tariff bill and that it is the sense of this conference that the Senate should at this session pass a soldiers' compensation bill, and that the Finance Committee be requested to report such a bill within a reasonable time; and,

Whereas, the amended soldiers' compensation bill was reported to the Senate by the Finance Committee on the 8th day of June, 1922, and is now on the Senate calendar for the action of the Senate; and,

Whereas, reports have been made and circulated to the effect that the soldiers' compensation bill might be abandoned at this session; and,

Whereas, such reports are without any foundation whatever, and the position taken by the Republican conference of the 19th day of April, 1922, has been in no respect modified or changed;

Now, therefore, for the purpose of correcting such reports and to reassure the country and the American soldier that there has been no change of purpose on the part of the Republican members of the Senate,

Be It Resolved by this conference, that as soon as the votes are taken on the passage of the tariff bill, the soldiers' compensation bill shall be immediately taken up and made the unfinished business, and its consideration proceeded with to the exclusion of any other business, except when temporarily laid aside for matters of immediate exigency, and continue the unfinished business until it is finally disposed of; and,

Be It Further Resolved, that both the said bills shall be pressed to their final disposition as expeditiously as possible and that there shall be no final adjournment of this Congress nor any recess taken until both these proposed measures are finally disposed of."
