Be it resolved by the Council of the City of Marion, State of Ohio, three-fourths of all the members elected thereto concurring.

A. That it is hereby declared necessary to improve Grand Avenue from Church street to Indiana Avenue by constructing a sanitary sewer and cellar drain with the necessary catch-basins, in accordance with plans, specifications, estimates and profiles of the proposed improvement prepared by the City Engineer and now on file in the office of the Board of Public Service which are hereby approved.

B. That the grade of said street as improved shall be as shown on the plans and specifications.

C. That the whole cost of said improvement, less one-fifth thereof, and the cost of intersection shall be assessed by the foot frontage, upon the following described lots and lands, to-wit: all lots and lands bounding and abutting upon the proposed improvement which said lots and lands are hereby determined to be especially benefited by said improvement; and that the cost of said improvement shall include the expense of preliminary and other surveys, and of the printing and publishing of notices, resolutions and ordinances required, and the serving said notices, cost of construction together with the interest on bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of the deferred installments of assessments, and other necessary expenses.

D. That the assessment so to be levied shall be paid in five annual installments with interest on deferred payments and not to exceed six (6) per cent. per annum, providing that the owner of any property assessed may, at his option, pay such assessment in cash, or any number of installments of the same at any time, after such assessment has been levied, with interest on the semi-annual interest day of said bonds next following the date of payment.

E. That bonds of the City of Marion, Ohio, shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of the assessments by installments and in any amount equal thereto.

RESOLUTION NO. 4.—Declaring it necessary to improve Prospect street from Hill street to the South corporation line by grading, setting curbs and crossings, constructing the necessary drains and retaining walls, gutters and catch-basins, determining the general nature of the proposed improvement, the grade thereof and approving plans, specifications and profiles thereof.

Be it resolved by the Council of the City of Marion, State of Ohio, three-fourths of all the members elected thereto concurring.

A. That it is hereby declared necessary to improve Prospect street from Hill street to the South corporation line by grading, setting curbs and crossings, constructing the necessary drains, retaining walls, catch-basins and gutters, and paving the roadway with sheet asphalt or vitrified brick block in accordance with the plans, specifications, estimates and profiles of the proposed improvement prepared by the City Engineer and now on file in the office of the Board of Public Service, which are hereby approved.

B. That the grade of said street as improved shall be as shown on said plans and profiles, to-wit: The established grade.

C. That the whole cost of said improvement, less one-fifth thereof, and the cost of intersection shall be assessed by the foot frontage, upon the following described lots and lands, to-wit: all lots and lands bounding and abutting upon the proposed improvement which said lots and lands are hereby determined to be especially benefited by said improvement; and that the cost of said improvement shall include the expense of preliminary and other surveys, and of the printing and publishing of notices, resolutions and ordinances required, and the serving of said notices, cost of construction together with the interest on bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of the deferred installments of assessments, and other necessary expenses.

Madison, Wis.—Dr. A. M. Moore, professor of agronomy of the college of agriculture of Wisconsin University, has succeeded, after much experimenting, in developing or "breeding" a species of Indian corn that yields 150 bushels to the acre. This is more than twice the average of corn in Wisconsin. Last spring Prof. Moore was allotted 22 acres of the university farm for his experiment with his corn, and a test just made shows that the yield runs a little more than 150 bushels to the acre. Prof. Moore believes that this new species of corn is adaptable to all of the states in the same latitude as Wisconsin.

"TICK" KILLS 15,000 CATTLE.

Cattlemen Want Government Aid in War on Deadly Insect.

Midland, Tex.—The cattlemen of Texas are much aroused over the fever tick question. It is stated that more than 15,000 head of cattle have died in the country bordering on the cattle quarantine line in Texas this year.

Dan McCuningham, of Colorado City, Tex., who is in charge of a squad of men who have been trying to exterminate the fever tick in this section, says that the Texas cattlemen should secure help from the federal government in a movement to exterminate the tick. He urges that a meeting of cattlemen not only of Texas, but of the entire north and west should be held for the purpose of giving public expression on the important subject.

"The destructiveness of the cattle fever tick is not realized by many people who are interested in the cattle business," he said. "The tick killed more than 15,000 head of cattle along the quarantine line last summer, and there is no telling how many more deaths it will cause. Of course the federal government will not accept any financial assistance from the cattlemen, but the latter can be of great usefulness in the work of cooperating with the federal authorities. It has come to a show down now as to which will win, the extermination of the ticks or the extermination of the cattle north and west of the state and federal quarantine line."

ROMANCE OF A PRIEST.

Young Italian Suddenly Disappears from Sight.

Rome.—The whole press continues to publish many particulars regarding the mysterious disappearance of Father Carones, which is daily becoming more complicated. It now seems positively ascertained that the statement of Monsignore Ferri, general of the Camilliani order, according to which Father Carones was a companion of Italian emigration, is untrue. Besides, it is proved that Carones disappeared from the Madonna church on September 2, but left Rome only two days after, during which time he was concealed here. Why, the papers ask. Then he went to Genoa, but did not leave there on September 12, informing his superior only from on board ship about his determination to abandon the Madonna church and go to America. Mysterious incidents have been discovered, all connected with ladies desperately in love with the young, handsome, soldierly rector. Two of these ladies, having met on the staircase of his house next to the church, had a regular battle. Opinion differs about the girl who is supposed to have fled with Carones. According to the Messaggero she belongs to a distinguished Roman family, but according to the Patria she is a foreigner, probably an American, who left for New York the week before Carones.

Hawk Tries to Carry Away Dog.

Joseph Wood and his nephew, Peter McLain, accompanied by a dog, went tramping along the branch in Thorpy's wood pasture, and a large hawk flew down and seized the dog's head in its claws. The dog ran 50 rods or more with its feathered assailant holding to its prey before young McLain could overtake the fugitives and kill the hawk with a club.

Carr's Trade Letter

Weekly review of Grain Trade Conditions which are shaping prices, prepared expressly for the Mirror by the Farmer Commission House of H. H. Carr & Company, 96 Board of Trade, Chicago, Illinois.

Study of the wheat situation just now must be world-wide. Latest cables indicate that estimates on yields in Argentine provinces are

being reduced. Within the past 24

hours, Russian advices indicate winter crop killing in central districts from very severe weather. Germany has this week had the coldest weather in 20 years and all Europe is more or less excited over the adverse winter crop outlook. With our Northwest States tied up by blizzards and blocked railroads and the big mills drawing wheat out of elevators to grind at Minneapolis, the cash wheat prices very stiff at Minneapolis, Omaha, Kansas City and here, export and milling interests beginning to make inquiry for choice wheat in Chicago houses, the public becoming greatly interested in price making and profitable speculation, we see no reason why an upward tendency will not continue.

Late reports indicate Argentine growing crop prospect reduced 60 per cent. by severe drought. We look for Europe to turn to our ports for much larger supplies. Foreign buyers have taken about 600,000 bushels of corn here and at the seaboard the past two days. Philadelphia and Baltimore exporters are after corn in Illinois points as well as in this market. There is another very important consideration in sight—the probability that the West will supply a large corn move, met at once with a continuation of reasonably clear cold weather. We see the first real indication of this in the promise of nearly 750 cars of corn for this market Monday of next week. We advise farmer shippers and others to get their corn on the market at the earliest possible date.

All the standard oats in Chicago houses would be moved out in three days if the cars were at hand. Stocks are far below normal. Greater shipping demand is due. We still believe in an advance in May oats to 40 cents or over when the bull leaders see fit to start the market higher.
