ODDS AND ENDS OF WORLD'S WORK

And Also its Troubles Gathered up For Those Who Are Interested in the Odd Jobs.

Failed to Reach Summit. Fairbanks, Alaska, April 10.—Four men who left Fairbanks on February 5 to climb Mount McKinley were back today with the admission that they had failed to reach the summit. They declared, however, that the ascent can be made by a different route than the one they followed.

George S. Lewis, former United States reclamation engineer; Martin Nash, of Dawson; Anson McCabell and Jack Phillips, a dog driver, made up the party.

The party reported that at a height of about 10,000 feet they were confronted with great ice cliffs that made further progress impossible.

Passaic Strike Over. Passaic, N. J., April 10.—The textile strike in Passaic and vicinity is over. Not officially, but as far as the strikers are concerned, it is over, and they have received only a small proportion of their demands. The workers have received an increase of from five to 15 per cent and a reduction of fines. There will be no recognition, however, of the shop committee.

Lindbergh in Earnest. Washington, April 10.—An investigation of the investigating committee of the house on trial of the "money trust" was announced today by Representative Lindbergh, Republican, Minnesota. He followed up his attack of yesterday upon the banking committee, declaring he will "smoke out" certain members alleged to be Wall street sympathizers. That Pub. Democrat, Louisiana, and Representative Vreeland, Republican, New York, are opposing a real probe of the money octopus was Lindbergh's declaration.

Break a Mile Wide. Hickman, Ky., April 11.—The crevasse in the government levee, which broke last Friday, is one mile wide today and the water is still flooding into the Redford lake district today but further damage is not anticipated. Government engineers who have examined the break estimate that in some places inside the levee line the water has seeped out holes to a depth of 50 feet.

The government relief work is now systematized. It is planned to bring rations for 4,000 people here every four days.

Believes Socialists Should be Represented. Bridgeport, Conn., April 10.—Governor Baldwin believes that the Socialists of Connecticut should have proportional representation in the general assembly, despite the fact that they are not strong enough in any single district to elect their candidate. He told the Bridgeport lodge of Moose that he believed the fact that the Socialists polled a vote of 10,000 in the state entitled them to representation.

On His Travels. Johnstown, Pa., April 10.—Colonel Roosevelt spoke at Jeannette 1,000; Greensburg, 1,500; Latrobe, 1,000; Harrisville, 800. At Greensburg he said: "I am glad at last in Pennsylvania you will have a chance to show that you are your own masters."

Before a crowd of 5,000 in the opera house here the colonel said: "You cannot get a square deal from the bosses. I want you to show next Saturday as they did in Illinois yesterday that you are able to govern yourselves. The bosses are afraid of trust you. They have brought out fake Roosevelt candidates to divide the vote. I want you to support Mahlon H. Meyers and W. T. Baldrige. They are straight goods."

Supposed Yegmen Arrested. Painesville, O., April 10.—Three men suspected of being implicated in futile attempts to rob the postoffice at Madison and Perry early today were arrested by Marshal Maloney at Willoughby this afternoon.

Sheriff Baker and Deputy Sheriff Graves went to bring them back to the county jail for detention pending investigation by the federal inspectors. In the last two months cracksmen have secured \$20,000 loot from postoffices in northern Ohio.

Col. Bryan at Indianapolis. Indianapolis, Ind., April 10.—William J. Bryan will speak on "Democracy's Triumph" at the Jefferson day banquet of 1,000 Democrats of Indiana here Friday night, according to an announcement today. Senator Kern will act as toastmaster. Bryan will be entertained by Governor and Mrs. Marshall during his visit here.

Miss Molsant Retires. Wichita Falls, Tex., April 10.—After an exhibition flight here, Miss Mathilde Molsant, probably the most noted woman aviator in the country, announced her retirement from the flying game.

"My relatives have been urging me for some time to quit," said Miss Molsant, "and when I learned of the death of Cal Rodgers, I made up my mind to give up aviation."

Discussed No Politics. Youngstown, O., April 10.—Woodrow Wilson, in his first public appearance in Ohio since he became a candidate for the presidency, refused to discuss politics.

Five hundred persons greeted him here this afternoon when he passed through enroute to Pittsburg to speak there tonight.

"For reasons which are obvious," he said, "I can't talk politics here." He shook hands with every one who managed to reach him.
