**HEALTH PROJECT AN ACTIVITY OF FARM BUREAU**

**Promotion of Health Through Instruction Through Township Workers**

**MISS WANDA PRZYLUKSA IS STATE INSTRUCTOR**

**Six Workers Engaged In Carrying Gospel Of Health To Their Communities**

One of the activities carried on in Knox county in connection with Farm Bureau work, in common with a number of other counties in the state fostered by the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation, is a health project. This work has been under the direction of Miss Wanda Przyluska, health specialist of the Ohio Agricultural College at Columbus.

The last report of Miss Przyluska shows that 114 leaders have been trained in 13 counties within the state, and that 232 meetings have been held within these counties. Each township of each county organized is to have a leader and an assistant leader who are selected through the local organization in each township.

Thus far Knox county has six leaders in as many townships. It is the expectation of S. L. Anderson, county agent, that still others may be appointed, should the work be carried on further.

The work of the health project is carried forward through a series of four meetings, which Miss Przyluska supervises and personally attends. All have been held in Knox county. The program consists of four demonstration meetings and a follow up meeting after the completion of the course. These meetings are attended by the leaders and assistants and following each meeting they go back to their townships and demonstrate each lesson to their community. By the time each woman in the township has received the instructions of the first lesson, it is time for the second. These lessons usually last an entire day with the mornings devoted to demonstrations by Miss Przyluska and the afternoons given over to the leaders practicing what they have learned during the morning.

The health project is really a "Care of the Sick" project, which in many instances has been extended to take in child health. The first lesson deals with the discussion and demonstration of making and cleaning the bed with a patient in it; changing nightgowns and giving a bath to the patient; the daily routine of the sick room, stressing little things that do much to make the patient comfortable.

The second meeting deals with the demonstration of temperature and pulse taking and respiration readings, with something about treatments to reduce fever or produce perspiration.

At the third meeting the leaders study methods in giving different types of treatments prescribed by the doctor; family medicine chest and what it should contain; the preparation of simple dressings and the
