DEWEY HAS BEEN HEARD FROM.

He Holds Manila Bay and Can Take the City of Manila at His Pleasure.

HIS VICTORY IS UNPRECEDENTED.

Spanish Fleet and Land Batteries Destroyed Without the Loss of a Man or Damage to a Ship.

ELEVEN SPANISH SHIPS SENT TO THE BOTTOM.

Number of Spanish Killed Unknown, but the Hero is Caring For Over Two Hundred Sick and Wounded Spanish Soldiers.

DEWEY TO BE HONORED FOR HIS VICTORY.

The President Will Name Him to the Rank of Rear Admiral—Troops and Supplies Will Be Sent to Him From San Francisco.

Washington, May 7.—Dewey has been heard from. He is in Manila bay and king of the surroundings. His fleet is intact and not a man displaced. He is caring for 150 sick and wounded Spanish soldiers. On the other hand 11 Spanish warships lie at the bottom of the bay and the land batteries are no more.

The news came direct from Dewey. He sent his dispatch boat McCulloch from Manila to Hong Kong and from there were sent to the navy department this morning.

The dispatch boat left Manila on Wednesday and reached Hong Kong sometime late last night.

The signal victory of Commodore Dewey caused utter astonishment among all officials and the people of the capital city. It is impossible to see how he utterly destroyed the entire Spanish fleet and reduce the land batteries with no loss to himself. The only theory is that his orders to his men just before the battle were carried out to the letter. Just before the engagement he counseled with the men of his fleet and said: "Keep cool and pay no attention to anything, but orders."

Praise is heaped upon him by all, and there is great joy in Washington. On every corner groups of men gathered, discussing the reckless manner in which Dewey rushed in the bay and took everything before him.

The authorities will send help to Dewey at once. The cruiser Charleston, just finished and commissioned at San Francisco, and which is a modern cruiser, will leave for the Philippines at the earliest possible moment.

The City of Pekin will accompany the cruiser. On the City of Pekin will be troops and supplies for Commodore Dewey's squadron.

The first cablegram from the hero of Manila is as follows:

"Manila, May 1.—The squadron arrived at Manila at daybreak this morning. Immediately engaged the enemy and destroyed the following war vessels: Reina Cristina, Castilla, Ulloa, Isla de Cuba, General Lazo, The Duero, Correo, Velasco, Mindanao, one transport and the water battery at Cavite. The squadron is uninjured and only a few men slightly wounded. Only means of telegraphing is to American consul at Hong Kong. I shall communicate with him."

The second dispatch from Commodore Dewey reads:
"Cavite May 4.—I have taken possession of the naval station at Cavite on the Philippine Islands. Have destroyed the fortifications at the bay entrance, patrolling the garrison. I control the bay completely and can take the city any time. The squadron in excellent health and spirits. The Spanish loss not fully known, but very heavy, 150 killed including the captain of Reina Cristina. I am assisting in protecting the Spanish sick and wounded, 250 sick and wounded being in the hospital within our lines. There is much excitement in Manila. I will protect foreign residents."

"Dewey."
By direction of the president, Secretary Long sent the following cable dispatch to Commodore Dewey:
"The president in the name of the American people thank you and your officers and men for your splendid achievement and overwhelming victory. In recognition he has appointed you acting admiral and will recommend a vote of thanks to you by congress."

MORE RIOTS IN SPAIN.

At Madrid Much Excitement Prevails and the Situation is Serious.

Madrid, May 7.—Much excitement prevailed here at noon today. Serious riots are anticipated. Martial law has been proclaimed at Ciudad.

A decree has been gazetted allowing free entry to cereals, etc., into Spain.

Compos the Last Chance.

Hendaye, France, near the Spanish Frontier, May 7.—Madrid advises say military dictatorship headed by Marshal Campos is probably the last chance to save the dynasty.

SUEZ CANAL IS OPEN.

The United States or Spain Can Pass Through, but Cannot Fight Within.

Washington, May 7.—If Spain desires to send a fleet to the Philippines to attack Commodore Dewey's forces she is at perfect liberty to send it through the Suez canal," was the statement made by a high official of the state department.

"There is a great deal of popular ignorance on this point. As a matter of fact, the Suez canal is open to belligerents. The principle of the neutralization of the Suez canal was applied by the convention of Oct. 29, 1888, which was signed by the six great powers, by Turkey, Spain and the Netherlands. Strictly speaking, this does not bind the powers that were not parties to the convention, but as none are of any importance except the United States, and all have distinctly acquiesced in what was done, the practical result is much the same as if the whole body of civilized nations had formally expressed their adhesion to it.

"The convention declares the canal to be open in time of war as in time of peace to all ships, whether merchantmen or vessels of war, whether belligerent or neutral, but no acts of hostility are to be committed either in the canal itself or in the sea to a distance of three miles from either end of it.

"The entrance is not to be blockaded. The stay of belligerent vessels of war or their prizes within the ports at either end is not to exceed 24 hours, and belligerents are not to embark troops or munitions of war within the canal or its ports.

"By using the Suez canal, Spain's vessels will be compelled to go only 7500 miles to reach Manila. The steaming radius of the Almirante Oquendo, Vizcaya and Infanta Maria Teresa is 9,700 miles, going at the rate of ten knots, and they, therefore could go the entire distance without refueling. If necessary they could take coaling along. None of Commodore Dewey's vessels has such a great steaming radius and if they should be sent to the Mediterranean they would have to take coaling along and might be caught without coal in that sea.

"None of the members of the war board believes for an instant that Spain will attempt to retake the Philippines, notwithstanding the Suez canal is open to her fleets. It was pointed out by an expert with whom I talked that the withdrawal of a sufficient force from the Atlantic to attempt the recapture of the Philippines would place not only Cuba and Puerto Rico but the Canaries and Spain at the mercy of the American warships on this coast."

Father Sherman Goes to War.
St. Louis, May 7.—The son of the late General William T. Sherman, the Rev. Father Thomas Sherman, has been appointed chaplain of the Fourth regiment, Missouri National guard. Father Sherman declined to express an opinion of the consequences of the war. He was asked by Colonel Corley of the Fourth regiment to accept the position as chaplain and he readily consented. He is familiar with camp life, having spent considerable time with his father during the late war.

American Securities Went Up.
London, May 7.—The news from Manila caused a jump upward of American securities on the Stock Exchange.

EXPECTING THE FLEET.

The San Juan Harbor Prepared For the Cape Verde Squadron.

New York, May 7.—A special from San Juan de Porto Rico says that preparations are being made for the reception of the Spanish Cape Verde fleet, the arrival of which is expected almost momentarily. The only warship now in the harbor of San Juan is the Isabella. The harbor has been cleared of non-combatant vessels to make room for the anchorage of the Cape Verde fleet. All merchantmen have been pulled up under the protection of the hills, fearing a bombardment by the American fleet.

Nations For Troops.

Chicago, May 7.—The government has ordered 3,000,000 rations now in Chicago to be sent at once to Chattanooga. This will amount to about four train loads of bacon, hard bread, sugar, coffee, beans, salt, pepper and vinegar, the component parts of the soldiers' bill of fare. The bacon alone amounts to 37 carloads. This will go by three different roads in order to minimize delay.

BREAD RIOTS IN ITALY.

Martial Law Proclaimed at Florence and Some Riots Shot and Killed.

Rome, May 7.—The general situation here is regarded as being distinctly grave. It now seems to be clearly demonstrated that politics are mixing up in the disturbances which have occurred in various parts of the kingdom, owing to the high price of bread, and the clerical party is believed to be fomenting disorder. A royal decree has been issued proclaiming martial law throughout Tuscany, one of the most fertile and best cultivated parts of Italy.

There was serious rioting at Florence, the capital of Tuscany and further disturbances at Leghorn; at both places a number of rioters were killed or wounded by troops detailed to maintain order.

WILL TRY AGAIN.

Walter Wellman Will Go In Search of the North Pole and Andree.

New York, May 6.—Walter Wellman will start Tuesday on another expedition in an endeavor to reach the north pole. He hopes also to determine the fate of Andree, who has not been heard from since two days after he stepped into his balloon.

On June 15 he is to meet at Tromsø, Norway, Lieut. E. B. Baldwin and others. The party, well equipped with crew, dogs, sleds, provisions and scientific instruments, will sail for the Arctic regions June 20.

China Pays Japan.

London, May 7.—Representatives of China paid the representatives of Japan over £11,000,000 (\$45,000,000) at the Bank of England at noon today, this being the balance of the China-Japan war indemnity. Japanese troops will forthwith commence the evacuation of Wei Hai Wei. The date of the British occupation of Wei Hai Wei is not yet settled.

All Trains Suspended.

Texarkana, Ark., May 7.—There has been a total suspension of trains to this city from the north on the Kansas City, Pittsburg and Gulf road for the last four days, the condition being due to terrific washouts between Texarkana and Menard.

On a Rampage.

Little Rock, May 7.—The Arkansas river is on a rampage and has left its banks, doing incalculable damage to property and causing the loss of an unknown number of lives. The situation is serious now and is growing worse every hour.

Beginning to Recede.

Guthrie, O. T. May 7.—The high waters are beginning to recede, and for the first time in four days the Santa Fe trains are running south from here.

Red River Rising.

Denison, Tex., May 7.—Red river is rising considerably, but shows no signs of a flood like the streams further north in the Indian Territory. It is not likely that Red river will not bank full.
