CHICAGO MAN ENDS HIS LIFE IN EL PASO

Body of T. C. Gibbs Found in a Room at Normandie Hotel.

T. C. Gibbs, who had been a resident of El Paso for two days, ended his life some time Tuesday night at the Normandie hotel, at the corner of San Antonio and Campbell streets, by taking a dose of carbolic acid. He left no note or other explanation of the deed and was apparently in good health. The body was not discovered until 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon when the room was opened and coroner E. H. Watson summoned. The coroner found that he had committed suicide by drinking carbolic acid which had burned his lips and throat, and an empty bottle near the body indicated that he had used this means. Nagley & Kaster, to whose funeral parlors the remains were removed, received a telegram from F. Montgomery, of the Chicago Masons, of which he was a 32d degree member, requesting them to embalm the body and ship it to Chicago. Gibbs was a well known business man of Chicago having been engaged in the marble business there and having maintained an office in the Tacoma building. He went to his room in the hotel about 8 o'clock Tuesday night, and was never seen alive again.

Wright, pastor of the Trinity Methodist church, and the bride and groom left over the Santa Fe Wednesday evening for a honeymoon trip through the west. Miss Zeiger is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Zeiger, and Mr. Potter is the son of Allen R. Potter, of St. Louis. He is the owner of "El Gato" ranch near Casas Grandes, Mexico, and is well known in El Paso. Mr. and Mrs. Potter will make their home in El Paso.

FARMERS' UNION FACTIONS FIGHT

One Side Wants Cheaper Cotton Rates; One Side Wants Higher.

Austin, Tex., Feb. 10.—Hostilities were renewed today between the Loundermilk and Lomax factions of the Farmers' union before the railroad commission over the fight to reduce cotton rates. Chairman Mayfield rebuked both sides, requesting them to confine their arguments to the business at hand. W. J. Lomax declared that he favored a reduction until he learned that it would result in the loss of low interstate cotton seed rates. W. T. Loundermilk testified in favor of the cut rate. G. Radetzki, general manager of the Houston and Texas Central, declared wages had increased 7 percent and operating expenses are higher.

MR. AND MRS. J. C. COGAN. New York, N. Y., Feb. 10.—Naming as co-respondent a Salvation Army captain, suit was brought in the supreme court by John C. Cogan, a wealthy manufacturer, of Greenpoint, L. I., for an absolute divorce from Mary E. Cogan. The Cogans were married 16 years ago and have three children, the oldest being a girl 15 years old.

IMPORTS TOTAL OVER MILLION

El Paso Handle 75 Percent of Cattle Business From Mexico.

Cattle imports through the El Paso port last year totaled 105,455 head and these were valued at \$1,442,159.75.

These figures are shown by the official report recently compiled by the statistical clerk at the customs house and represent about 75 percent of all cattle imported from Mexico.

Merchandise imports through the El Paso port last month aggregated \$235,162, while the exports were valued at \$272,000. During January gold and silver exports amounted to \$10,785, while metals imported were valued at \$322,080.

INCOME TAXES WANTED BY COUNTRY

Senator Borah Declares That the People Demand Right to Tax Wealth.

ROASTS HUGHES ON HIS ATTITUDE

Washington, D. C., Feb. 10.—Senator William E. Borah, of Idaho, took occasion in the senate today to attack the position of those who oppose acceptance by the several states of the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States which would permit the levying of a tax on incomes without apportionment between the states. Incidentally the senator paid his respects to governor Hughes, of New York, including him by inference among those who profess to be in favor of an income tax but oppose practical measures which would permit its enforcement. His allusion was of course to governor Hughes' annual message to the New York state legislature urging defeat of the proposed amendment on the ground that its language might be so construed as to authorize congress to tax incomes derived from state and municipal bonds.

Public Mind Suspicious. Senator Borah pictured the mind of the public as in a state of suspicion and discontent toward the government, and declared that the people could not much longer be withheld from radical action in taxation were continued in protection of wealth and in exemption of "incomes which sustain luxury and breed idleness and idiosyncrasy." The senator said in substance: "The history of the income tax since 1894 has not been one which any citizen can recite with pride. For 100 years a rule of construction as established by the men who helped to write the constitution had received the approval of an undivided court time and time again. During this period there sat upon the bench of the supreme court some of the greatest lawyers of that or any other period of this or any other country. During this period the wealth of the country had not become so diminishing, so powerful, so determined to have its own way. During this period, therefore, we had under the constitution the right to impose a part of the tax upon wealth and a part upon consumption and we did so.

Burdens Not Divided. "In 1894 and 1895 these precedents were overturned, this constitution received its interpretation unknown to its makers. In the face of two most powerful dissenting opinions to which two other judges assented, the humiliating and astounding doctrine was announced that the makers of the republic had intended to divide the burden of government between the people and the taxing powers of the government could not reach it even in time of war; that the founders of a government based upon equality and justice had made it impossible to divide the burdens of government between the people and the state. We submitted this supposed amendment to remedy this supposed hideous defect in the fundamental law.


Government Shame of Tax Power. "Now the scheme and plan is to defeat the amendment by a law making body solemnly accepted this construction of the constitution, thereby making it impracticable again to appeal to the court, if this amendment can be defeated, this government of the people, for the people and by the people, will stand alone among all the civilized nations of the earth shorn of the power to tax that form of wealth best able to bear the burdens of government.

"This is the scheme and plan, and such men as the great governor of New York is giving them great aid and comfort. Men say with great fervor of patriotism, I am in favor of this power being given to the government to be used at least in time of war, and straightway proceed to help defeat the amendment. If those who are the real enemies of this measure would come into the open their friends could deal with them far more successfully.

Masses Are Restless. "Mr. President, no one ever saw this country in just the condition it is today. Never since this government was launched has there been such a restless spirit among the great masses of the people, such ugly questioning, such persistent inquiry. No part of the government seems to escape challenge or criticism, and it is fast becoming popular to scoff at the constitution itself. An unquiet, dissatisfied, suspicious public mind is the public mind of today.

"You can defeat this amendment. In view of the class of men who are joining the crusade against it I think you will defeat it. The forces which I propose to encompass its defeat will not stop on the hither side of the most disreputable methods to accomplish their purpose. But when the people learn what you have really done, the manner in which you have done it, and increased burdens everywhere, and learn furthermore that all this must be met by a tax on consumption while incomes which sustain luxury and breed idleness and idiosyncrasy, they will have little mercy upon you in the hour in which you must plead with them against radical changes in the government. I do not know how long we can deal with a patient people in this way. But I venture to prophesy for you that you will not last much longer.

"I hope therefore the governors and legislatures of this country will be brave enough to do their duty in this matter. It is time the people in this broad land bestir themselves upon this vital question before it is too late to do so. It would be nothing less than a catastrophe if this amendment should be defeated, if we are going also to be

cut off from an appeal to the court. This is in every sense the people's fight. The Senator's Conclusions. Senator Borah outlined his conclusions as follows: 1.—That the proposed amendment adds nothing to the taxing power of the national government. This power was complete, unfeathered, plenary, before. It can be no more than that should the proposed amendment be adopted. 2.—The proposed amendment does not deal or propose to deal with the question of power which is already complete but simply with the manner and method of its exercise and use of that power.

3.—No one has ever questioned the power of the national government to lay an income tax for as was said by Justice White, the question has always been "whether an admittedly unlimited power to tax has been used according to the instruction as to method," and it was to remedy the method alone that the amendment was submitted. 4.—The words "from whatever source" add nothing to the force of the amendment. It would be just the same if it said "to lay and collect taxes on incomes without apportionment" for who could then say that you would not have the right to lay taxes upon all incomes of the present tax? The power would not be a particle stronger if it said to lay and collect taxes upon all property from whatever source.

5.—To construe the proposed amendment so as to enable us to tax the instrumentalities of the state would do violence to the rules laid down by the supreme court for 100 years, wrench the whole institution from its harmonious proportions and destroy the object and purpose for which the whole instrument was framed. 6.—To construe it to cover these incomes from sources within the jurisdiction and control of the sovereignty laying the tax is to construe it in harmony with the principles given us by Marshall and followed from that hour to this.
