But it is useless to go on. Those white "patriots" who constitute the Texas Progressive Republican League have aimost, without exception, been holders of federal offices, and have been dismissed from the same. Julius Oppenheimer, the Republican county chairman of Bexar county, states that Mr. McGregor made this assertion to him. No such request for an interview came to me-from Mr. McGregor William H. Atwell, the U. S. district storney at Dalias, states that Mr. McGregor did not request him to ask an interview with ms and Lon M. Barkley, the postmaster at Ft. Now I object to being classed and compared with any member of the Texas Progressive Republican League, and serve notice that I shall claim protection, under the libel laws of the state of Texas, if any citizen of Texas again uses me in any such comparative statement. The law guarantees pretection to every citizen of Texas against harmful statements, and I now claim the protection of the libel laws of this state. I take this means of replying to the hundreds of inquiries which have reached me from all sections of Texas, asking concerning my presidential reached me from all sections of Texas, asking concerning my presidential preference. At the present moment the candidates asking for the Republican nomination for president are the president, Hon. William H. Taft, senator Cummins, of Iowa, and senator La Follette, of Wisconsin. At this moment my present preference is for an uninstructed delegation, for I have believed that those states which will probably cast Republican electoral votes should be the ones to make first expression of their sentiment, and this announcement is all that I have made to date.

My personal preference would be for the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt, and should he become a candidate of the national convention, and if election is the national convention of the national convention is manager. It is my understanding that president Taft through his manager, Charles D. Hille, has asked H. F. McGregor to assume the management of the Taft campaign in this state. That is entirely satisfactory to me, but, while no man has greater bespect for the high office of president of the United States than I have, I do not grant to the president of the United States, nor to any man, the right to assail and attempt to destroy the Republican organization in this state. I know what has been done in the way of improving the organization in the state, and any man who assails that organization, be his political affiliations what they may, need expect no political support from me.
