CELL MEN IS FOR ROOSEVELT

(Continued from Page 1)

The regular Democratic organization... The nominees for the primary for governor of Texas in 1910 was J. O. Terrell, of San Antonio, Texas, then and now a Republican. The nominees of the Republican party in Texas in 1908 was Col. John N. Simpson, of Dallas, then and now a Republican. Both of them today are avowed supporters of the re-nomination of President Taft.

Taft's Texas Manager... But it is useless to go on. Those who write "patriots" who constitute the Texas Progressive Republican League have almost without exception been holders of federal offices, and have been dismissed from the same. Those who have not been fortunate enough to hold these offices have mostly been unsuccessful applicants for federal offices, while the leader of the Taft forces in Texas has two of these times had the leadership of the Republican party of Texas denied him by the Republicans of Texas, and has had his application for a seat in the National Republican convention denied by that body.

Denies McGreggor's Charge... I could not believe that Mr. McGreggor had made such a deliberate misstatement, which could be defined in shorter language than this, but in order to ascertain the facts I visited the San Antonio, George D. Armistead, of the San Antonio Express, who wrote this interview with Mr. McGreggor. Mr. McGreggor did not make this statement to him. Julius Oppenheimer, the Republican county chairman of Bexar county, states that Mr. McGreggor made this assertion to him. No such request for an interview came to me from Mr. McGreggor. I am H. Atwell, district attorney at Dallas, states that Mr. McGreggor did not request him to ask an interview with McGreggor at Ft. Worth, who was present at the interview between Mr. McGreggor and Mr. Atwell. Mr. McGreggor did not request Mr. Atwell to attempt to arrange an interview with me. This statement is given out merely that Mr. McGreggor may be placed in his proper light before the citizens of his home state, and so far as I am concerned, this is a closed matter. The citizens of Texas can judge between the veracity of Mr. McGreggor and the four men named above. I have nothing whatever to do with it.

Says He Was Libeled... Just one thing I object to in the report of the meeting of the Texas Republican League. The report in the Dallas News of February 22 says: "One speaker asserted, with an awesome array of language, that he would reply (referring to a reply Mr. McGreggor had given) was just the variety Col. Lyon would have given to the same question." Now the object of being libeled and compared with any member of the Texas Progressive Republican League, and served a notice of small claim protection, under the libel laws of the state of Texas, if any citizen of Texas against which any such comparative statement. The law guarantees protection to every citizen of Texas against harmful statements, and the protection of the libel laws of this state. I take this means of replying to the hundreds of inquiries which have reached me from all sections of Texas, asking concerning my presidential preference. At the present moment the candidates asking for the Republican nomination for president are the president, Hon. William H. Taft, senator Cummins, of Iowa, and senator La Follette, of Wisconsin. At this moment my present preference is for an uncommitted delegation, for I have believed that those states which will probably cast Republican electoral votes should be the ones to make first expression of their sentiment, and this announcement is all that I have made to date.

Favors Roosevelt... My personal preference would be for the nomination of William Roosevelt, yet, and should he become a candidate, I shall become a candidate for delegates to the national convention, and I shall vote for the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt. It is my understanding that president Taft thought his manager, Charles D. Hille, has asked H. F. McGreggor to assume the management of the Taft campaign for the state. This is entirely satisfactory to me, but while no man has greater respect for the high office of president of the United States than I have, I do not grant to the president of the United States, nor to any man, the right to assault and attempt to injure the reputation of the leader of the Republican organization in this state. I know what has been done in the way of improving the organization in the state, and any man who assaults that organization, be his political affiliations what they may, need expect no political support from me. It is always distressing to the neighborhood when one attempts to clean a cess pool without using an odorless excavator, and I feel that no one has invented a political odorless excavator to this date, but I feel that the public should be apprised of the misstatements contained in the address of the so-called "Progressive Republican League of Texas." MAN IS SHOT IN CANUTILLO FIGHT

Reported that Plan Was to Kill J. B. Kilpatrick, Deputy Sheriff. During a fight between Mexicans and Americans at Canutillo, Tex., 12 miles northwest of El Paso, a Mexican had been named Willoughby was shot Saturday night. Trouble was started by an American, who, having imbibed a little too freely, told the Mexicans how much he loved them. Another American objected to his actions and started to mix things with him. Deputy sheriff J. B. Kilpatrick stepped in to separate the men and a Mexican came up behind him and knocked him down. An American stopped the Mexican and then someone fired a shot which struck Willoughby, who was taken away in a carriage to La Union. It has not been learned who fired the shot.

Deputy sheriff Kilpatrick said that he had ordered Willoughby out of a saloon there Saturday afternoon because he had become belligerent. Joe Spivey, who conducts a store at Canutillo, was informed by a Mexican that it had been planned to start a fight and then kill Kilpatrick because he was providing for the protection of Americans there. Feeding has been tense in the upper valley for several days.

CLARK HAS BRIEF SPELL OF LIBERTY

GRAFT INDICTMENTS MAY ALL BE DROPPED

San Francisco, Calif., Feb. 24.—District attorney Fickert informed superior judge Dunne today that a motion for the dismissal of all pending indictments in the so-called "graft" cases would be made March 2 because of the ruling by judge Dunne that he could not dismiss indictments against Abraham Raaf, former political boss of San Francisco, without acting on other pending graft indictments. Raaf's testimony is believed by the district attorney to be absolutely essential in the case of former mayor Schmitz, now on trial before Judge William F. Lawlor. Among the men indicted are former chief of police Jeremiah Dinan and James W. Coffroth, boxing promoter.
