Edward C. Houghton Says They Have Never Been Driven From Chihuahua.

FEDERALS REFUSE TO GO AFTER THEM

Edward C. Houghton jr. was a witness before the United States senate

Mexican investigation committee yesterday afternoon. He said he had just returned from the Corralitos ranch, where he had been for three weeks. At that time the ranch had lost from 20 to 30 head of cattle every day by the looting of the rebels. Last week they lost two stallions that cost \$1,000 gold apiece, as well as 17 other horses and a large amount of provisions. The looting took place only 10 miles from Casas Grandes, and, although Gen. Rabago, the federal commander in the region, had not sent more than 500 federal troops there and at Guzman, 60 miles from the ranch, and there are 100 more federals, a part of Rabago's

force, as well as several other detachments in nearby towns, these federal troops were ordered to stop the looting. They do not pursue the rebels, of whom there are 600 now camped on the Corralitos ranch. The rebels are not afraid of the some federal troops, who marched out of Casas Grandes about a mile and a half, till they came to the ranch fence, and then turned back. General Gaitan said he called for troops to protect the ranch he said he had no men to spare for that purpose, although the ranch is nearly reached by the rebels.

About 300 rebels are reported at Janos. Yesterday we received word that the rebels were coming to the headquarters at Comstock. The wires between here and Pearson and the west cut today. On Friday last a fight took place at
