Isabella, A Story of Myth Spanish Queen Did Not Sacrifice Her Jewels to Aid Columbus,

WSABELLA, daughter of the second king of Castile, was born April 32, king of Castile, was born April 23, 1451, and was married to Ferdinand of Arragon October 18, 1452. After the death of her brother, Henry IV. in 1474, she ascended the throne of Castile to the exclusion of her elder sister. Joanna, who had the rightful claim to the crown, Isabella having during the lifetime of her brother gained the favor of a majority of the estates of the kingdom, and on his death they declared for her, while those which held out were won over by the victorious arms of her husband, in the battle of Toro, in 1475. Thence forward their fortunes were inseparably blended. Isabella was a woman of clear intellect, resolute energy and unsellish matriotism and to her Spain owed much of the greatness among the nations of Europe in her time. The moral influence of her personal character over the Castillan gourt was incalculably great. The sincerity of her plety led her into great errors of state policy, which have never since been repaired. Her introduction of the inquisition and the banishment of 200,000 Jews from the land of their birth, because they refused to be converted to Christianity, are evidences of her hisotry. It must be said in exoneration of the queen that in her time, and chiefly in her country, heresy was considered the greatest of orimes, and that the burning of heretics was as legitimate then as capital punishment for murder in our time.
