LARGELY IN THE LARGER CITIES

Gain of From 10 to 25 Percent Is Reported by Many Churches: Graded Sunday School Lessons Are Criticized; Dr. McKim May Quit High Episcopal Position; the Pope Selects Burial Place in St. Peter's.

Reports in hand from St. Louis, Chicago, Cincinnati, Baltimore, Pittsburg, Valladelphia, Boston and New York indicate that church attendance, evening as well as morning on Sundays and at noon on week days where services are held at that hour, are 10 to 55 percent larger than in former years. The reports cover small as well as big churches having well known preachers, and they were gathered for the most part by newspaper reporters who themselves counted people in the congregations, and save in few instances, did not take the records of sextons.

These reports were confirmed also by some of the secretaries who fust attended the foreign missions conference of the United States and Canada, and the home missions council of America. These men, accustomed to observe and report, represented every principal religious body. The reports are confirmed a

ligious body. The reports are confirmed in another way, in that there is absence of fallures, resignations, sales of church properties and quarrels, which always accompany hard religious times

The same reports cover also the atterdance of men at the morning Sunday services and at the morning Sunday services and at the mounday services in down town districts where held. They come direct from the Second Presbyterian church, Chicago; Taborracie Presbyterian and Holy Trinity Episcopal, Philadelphia; Trinity Episcopal, Boston; Walnut Hills Christian, Cinctinnati; Broadway Tabemacle Congregational and Fifth Avenue Baptist, New York, and the Iamous Luther Memorial, Washington, and they show increase in proportion of men from 3 to 30 percent.
