

FEDERALS HAVE TAKEN \$750,000 IN BASEBALL STARS FROM ENEMY

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—About \$750,000 worth of baseball talent has jumped to the Federal League since the "outlaw" organization began its flirtation with the diamond stars. Walter Johnson, who has now jumped back to Washington Americans, was counted as most valuable, his price being fixed at \$50,000; Tinker was considered worth \$25,000, at least.

Ed Konetchy was valued at \$15,000 at the beginning of the 1914 season, but his work, during 1914, was rated as a star of the first water, and, no doubt, would have brought \$10,000 had he been offered for sale. Eddie Plank and Chief Bender, former Athletic twirlers, had a big value.

Benny Kauf, the sensational outfielder of the Indianapolis Feds, was a minor leaguer before he jumped to the Feds. His value then probably was \$2,000, but he's worth \$25,000 today. George Stovall, former manager of the Browns, ranks as a first class player and probably was worth \$15,000. "Hap" Myers, the Janey Brooklyn first baseman, was worth \$5,000.

Season and Doolan Rank High. Pitcher Tom Seaton and shortstop Mike Doolan, who jumped from the Phillies, rank as among the greatest players in the game. Seaton was worth \$20,000 at the least. He was rated as one of the greatest pitchers in the National League. Doolan, in the opinion of Charles Doolan, former manager of the Phillies, was the best shortstop in either league with the exception of Walter Marzullo of the Braves.

Hal Chase, who jumped the White Sox, was valued at \$10,000. Howard Cantrill, former Pittsburgh pitcher, was worth around \$10,000. So was Hendrix, another former Pirate pitcher. Earl Moore, who jumped to the Buffalo Feds, was worth \$5,000 at the least.

Others of Value. Among the other minor league pitchers who have jumped to the Feds, and whose valuation can be fixed at from \$5,000 to \$10,000 are: Frank Allen (Dodgers); Barker (Cincinnati); Sages (Cincinnati); "Pol" Perzitt (Cardinals); Davenport (Cincinnati); Quinn (Braves); Cunniff (New York); Brennan (Phillies); Mosely (Red Sox); Groome (Washington); Cullon (Naps); Hanklin Johnson (Naps); Packard (Cincinnati); "Chief" Johnson (Cincinnati).

Otto Knabe, was ranked as one of the best second basemen in the game when he played with the Phillies. His value was about \$15,000. Knabe jumped to the Feds and now is manager of the Baltimore Feds.

The Feds grabbed some mighty good catchers from the ranks of organized baseball.

BRYAN IS AGAIN LEADING LEAGUE

Lee Davis Moves Up Into Second Place With Houck; Nagle Leads Industrials.

The bowling during the past week on the Cactus club alleys left Joe Bryan, who is considered the best bowler El Paso has ever seen, still in the lead in the Big League, with an average of 155. Joe, however, fell down slightly, while his closest opponent, "Cap" Houck, picked up considerably, and Joe's four point lead of last week dwindled to one. Lee Davis, who is undoubtedly the best "money bowler" in the city, came up with a rush and moved into a tie for second place with Houck, while Scott White, who was the leader for two weeks, and the runnerup during the rest of the time in the first six weeks of the season, dropped back to fourth place. Ray Nagle, who still holds sway in the industrial league with an average of 174, K. H. Aber, his closest opponent being 12 pins back. O. J. Binford is a close third, having averaged only one pin less than Aber. In the Smelter League G. C. Abbott leads with a percentage of 161, while H. G. Bateman and N. N. Rhinheimer are tied for seconds with an average of 159. The Bankers' league finished the season during the week. Lefe Hill wound up well in the lead with an average of 189 in 21 games. Johnny Andrews was second, with 174, well ahead of the third man, C. Dreher, who finished the season with 161. N. Fowler was a close fourth, having a grand total of only 21 pins, and an average of only one less than Dreher. In the Federal League H. Soderholm is the nominal leader with an average of 151 in six games. The real leader, however, is L. Strellitz, who has rolled an average game of 149 in 24 games. The great game which Strellitz rolled during the past week, brought him up four points. P. Stein, who was the real leader last week with an average of 145, lost a point and is now only one point ahead of V. E. Keenig.
