SALE OF CAKES FOR THE BABES

First Sale Tomorrow; All Funds Go to Cloudfcroft Baby Sanatorium

Progress of the work for the "Save the Babies" week was reported by Mrs. H. F. Jenkins, general chairman of the "Save the Babies" work, at the meeting of the Equal Franchise league, held Thursday afternoon in the chamber of commerce.

Mrs. Jenkins reported the growth of the movement since it was started by the Franchise league seven weeks ago and the splendid cooperation given by the other women's organizations, and the merchants and printing companies of the city in preparing and distributing the educational literature for the "Save the Babies" week.

In the interests of the educational work for the welfare of the babies, talks on some sanitation and personal hygiene will be given at the various schools today. Mrs. Jenkins asked that all the sub-committee chairmen make their reports to her as soon as possible next week, so that she may, as general chairman, make a public report of the funds received.

On Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock there will be a lecture by Dr. W. L. Brown on "Flesh, Filth and Fatality." Illustrated by stereopticon slides. A short musical program will follow. There will be also an exhibit of photographic slides of the Baby Sanatorium at Cloudfcroft and the work that it is doing for sick babies. The lecture and slide demonstrations are free to the public.

The money raised during the "Save the Babies" week at the cake store conducted by the Women's club committee, and the baby garments sale, conducted by the Equal Franchise league, will be used for the Baby Sanatorium at Cloudfcroft.

The discussion and completion of the details of the "Save the Babies" week was the principal business of the meeting. Mrs. S. J. Pennell presided. Mrs. Alma J. Cox read the secretary's report. Mrs. A. Louise Dietrich reported on the remaining secretary that she had been notified by the state headquarters that the annual state suffrage convention would be held in Dallas, May 19, 21 and 22. Mrs. Horace A. Lay gave the treasurer's report. Following the business meeting, Mrs. S. J. Pennell conducted the study of children's art law, which was followed by a practice drill in parliamentary usage.

The sale of cakes and baby clothes will open tomorrow. The sale of baby clothes will be continuous throughout the following week.
