BUY FINE BULLS

High Grade Cattle Being Bought and Sold in the Marfa Country.

Marfa, Texas, March 7.—High quality characterizes the cattle being sold and received in the Marfa country during the past week. Several local cattlemen have purchased fine cattle to be added to their herds and several have sold fine cattle to outside stockmen.

Mitchell Sells Fine Bulls.
Six to ten months old Hereford bulls, recommended by cattlemen as good as those shipped in here from other states, have been sold during the past week by W. H. Mitchell. Four were bought by Tom Hawk, one by Henry Fischer of Alpine, and one by Tom Love, of Sierra Blanca.

Gillett Buys 22 Bulls.
Two year old Hereford bulls for which he paid \$12,000. They were purchased from Rodgers & Simpson at Independence, Mo., and were delivered by Jewell & Howell of Hereford, Texas. One of the bulls was sold back to Jewell & Howell for \$4000.

LONESOME VALLEY RANCH AND CATTLE ARE SOLD FOR \$41,500

The ranch includes between 6000 and 7000 acres of grazing land and the cattle number approximately 1000. He owns or holds under lease 1200 acres of salt river valley alfalfa, on which he is fattening \$10,000 worth of cattle and \$14,000 worth of sheep.

Owns 33 Sections.
Coble, who started his business career in the panhandle 15 years ago as a cowboy, now owns 33 sections of land in Hutchinson county in a solid tract, on which he has 5000 head of cattle. He also owns an alfalfa farm in Hansford county.

QUARANTINE AGAINST TEXAS CATTLE LIFTED BY ARIZONA
Phoenix, Ariz., March 7.—Arizona no longer has a quarantine against Texas cattle.

For many months cattle south of the federal quarantine line, drawn straight across the state of Texas and passing through Fort Worth, have been barred from Arizona except for immediate slaughter. The Arizona livestock sanitary board has modified this requirement so that any Texas cattle can be brought in after two dippings.

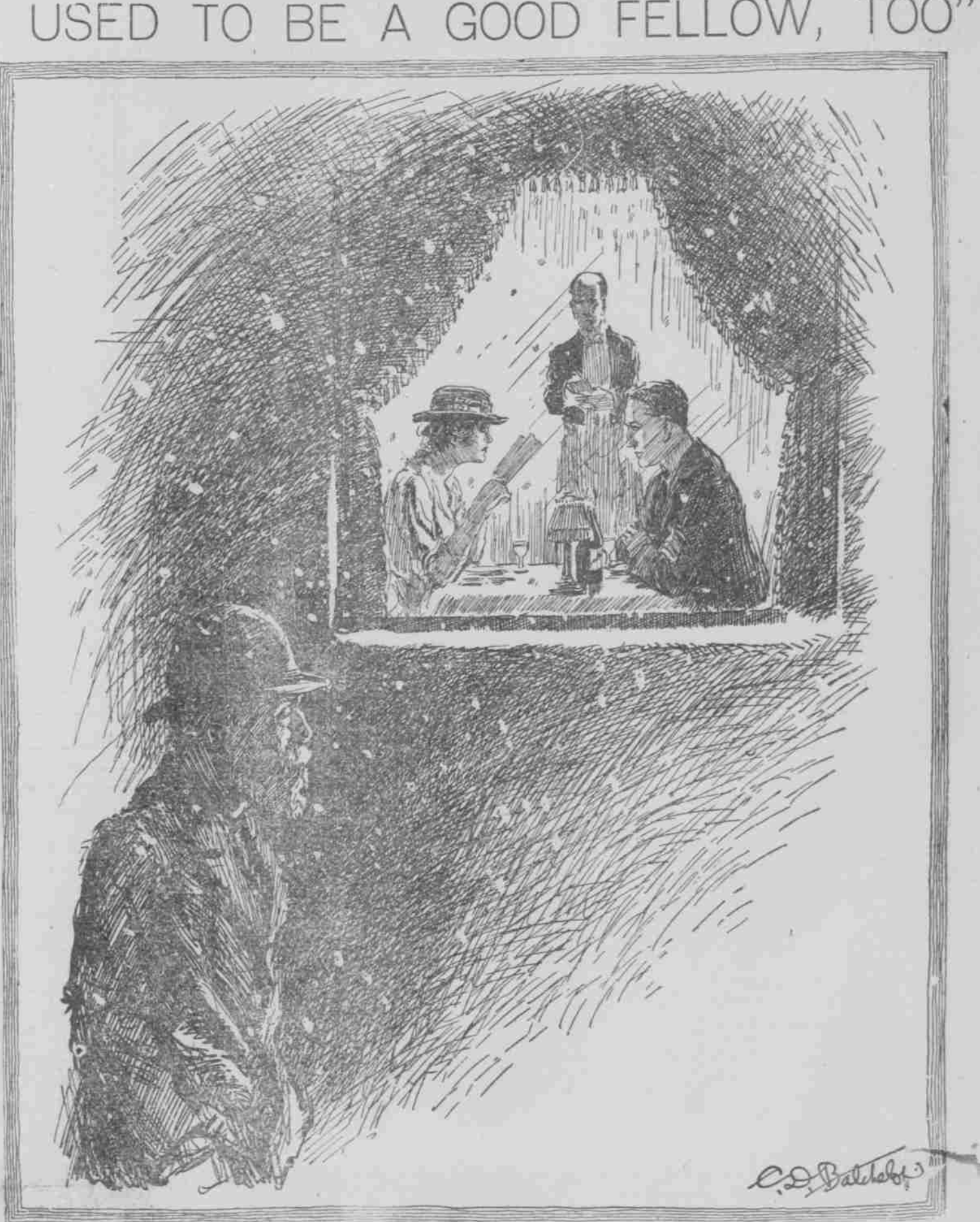
