RESOLUTION NO. 15

Be it resolved by the Town Council of the Town of Lynden, Washington,

SECTION 1. That it is the intention of the Town Council of the Town of Lynden, Washington, to order the improvement of Olive Street from the northerly Main track of the Chicago Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway Company on Pine Street to the northerly boundary of the Town of Lynden, by reggrading, making drains and culverts, construction of a bridge across Flushing Creek, and surfacing said Olive Street with a sixteen foot paved strip of concrete paving in the center of said street, and doing such other work as may be necessary in connection therewith, all in accordance with the plans to be prepared by the Town Engineer, J. C. Hills.

SECTION 2. That said street above described and to be so improved is hereby declared to be an arterial street in accordance with Chap. 52 of the Laws of 1913 of the State of Washington, and the county of Whatcom shall pay twenty-five per cent of the costs of said improvement in accordance with the provisions of said act.

SECTION 3. That the estimated cost of said improvement is the sum of \$5842.98.

SECTION 4. That it is proposed to create an enlarged district to pay that portion of the costs of such improvement as shall be chargeable against the property within the district. The boundaries of such enlarged district are hereby specified to be co-incident with and the same as the boundaries of the Town of Lynden.

SECTION 5. That there be assessed against that portion of the property within such enlarged district lying between the terminus of the proposed improvement and extending back from the marginal lines thereof to the middle of the block on each side thereof, and in unplatted lands abutting said street to the same distance back from the marginal line as in the platted portion adjacent thereto, in the mode prescribed by section 13 of Chapter 98 of the Session Laws of the State of Washington for 1911, the sum of \$1175.98, of the cost and expense of such improvement, and that the remainder thereof as such may not be borne by any general or special fund, or the County of Whatcom, be distributed and assessed against all the property included in the remainder of such enlarged district in accordance with the special benefits and all as provided by law.

SECTION 6. That all persons who may desire to object are hereby notified to appear and present such objections at a meeting of the town council to be held in the city hall in the city of Lynden at 8 o'clock, P.M. on the 17th day of June, 1921, which time and place are hereby fixed for hearing all matters relating to said proposed improvement, and all objections thereto, and for determining the method of payment for said improvement.

SECTION 7. That the Town Engineer shall submit to the Town Council at or prior to said date all data and information and plans as required by law to be submitted.

SECTION 8. That the costs and expenses of said improvement shall be borne by and be assessed against the property liable therefor all as provided by law.

Passed by the Town Council of the Town of Lynden, this 29th day of May, 1921.


