At her first rush she passed under the Essex and carried away a great length of her false keel; then, curling to the surface a considerable distance away, she appeared to take bearings and deliberately charged the vessel again, ramming her with such violence that she stove in the bows, while the ship rolled so heavily that the captain thought she must be dismantled. BEST ERA FOR ECHO JUST NOW OPENING.

Force of Men Under Horace W. King Employed in Placing Concrete Lining in the Government Ditch—Dr. Henry W. Coe Looks Over Furnish Irrigation Project.

Echo, Feb. 4.—That thousands of acres of new land will be under cultivation in the Echo country next season is now certain. Hundreds of acres of land have been purchased in this vicinity of late besides the homesteads that have been taken up in the wheat raising sections. That this will mean a great deal for the welfare of Echo is certain, and the good times have only just begun. Cold weather has prevailed for several days, and the boys and girls have been skating on the streams around here. Horace W. King, who has charge of the work at the Echo end of the project keeps a force of men at work on the concrete lining that is being put in at various places along the ditch. This work will soon be done, when the work in the vicinity of Echo on this project will be about complete. Dr. Coe of Portland, who has purchased a half interest in the furnish project was here the first of the week looking over conditions. He has much confidence in the future of this section. He is arranging to open a sales office here. Echo has been well represented at the county seat during the past week. A large number of the people were up as witnesses in the Haaga case. There has been sickness here of late, most of which was the gripe, though there were no serious cases. The bridge across the Umatilla at this place will be in condition for travel by the last of the week. A new span has been put in, new piers erected and it is now in condition to stand all future floods. Great preparations are being made by the Echo Cornet band for the masquerade ball that will be given by them February 14. James Kyle has been in Portland for several days on business. The Lamotts comedy company will play at the Echo opera house on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week.
