SEVERE PENALTY FOR VILE PRINTING

DEFUNCT JOB PLANT
PRINTED OBSCENE CARDS.

District Attorney Investigating Printing and Distribution of Objectionable Cards--None of Printing Plants Now in City Are Guilty of Crime--Defunct Job Establishment Did Illegitimate Work.

An investigation of the printing of the obscene cards for the distribution of which J. P. Medernach was fined \$100 in circuit court a few days ago, is being made by District Attorney G. W. Phelps in order that the blame for this crime may be placed.

In this investigation Mr. Phelps has discovered that the printing was done by a job printing plant which is now out of business, and the owner of which is now out of the state. It will be impossible to prosecute the parties guilty of committing this offense although Mr. Phelps is certain that he has definite information in the matter.

Stories have been circulated in the city charging the Pendleton Printery, the Pendleton Tribune and the East Oregonian with having printed the objectionable cards, but a thorough investigation by the district attorney has convinced him that the work was done by the printing establishment which recently suspended in this city.

As a large number of the saloons distributed objectionable cards it is evident that the printing plant in question did a large business of this kind and in justice to the newspapers and printing establishments now in the city Mr. Phelps declares that his information shows that the defunct plant printed the cards.

The penalty for printing obscene matter is \$500 fine or a jail sentence in the discretion of the court and it is the intention of the district attorney to prosecute every infraction of the law where it is possible to secure direct evidence.

BODY FOR THE DOCTORS.

Suicide Requests That Physicians Take Charge of His Remains.

That his body be turned over to medical men for examination was the request of Dan Avery, who cut his throat in the Athena jail yesterday. According to parties who saw Avery before the tragedy he intimated he was going to kill himself and said that when the Redmen, to which order he belonged, were through with his remains that it be given to the doctors. During his lifetime he had suffered from spinal trouble of some kind and he said something might be learned by the medical profession.

As there was no occasion for an inquest over the remains of Avery, none was held by Coroner Folsom, who returned home from Athena this morning.

OHIOANS WOULD ORGANIZE.

Follow Plan of Hoosiers and Representatives of Other States at Walla Walla.

Ohio is to be represented among the boosting clubs of the city. Local Buckeyes have found that there are a number in this city who would take an interest in such an organization and so the club will be born the first of the week, says the Walla Walla Bulletin.

This is in line with the other boosting clubs, the Hoosiers and the Nebraskans, both of which states have live organizations which will help in the development of Walla Walla. Other states will more than likely fall into line in the near future and the good these clubs can do, thus formed, is inestimable.

STRUCK OIL AT VALE.

Gusher Said to Be Spouting Oil to a Height of Five Feet.

Reports from Vale, Malheur county, say that an oil well near that city is now spouting a good flow of oil to a height of about five feet above the surface. The well belongs to the Malheur Gas and Oil company, which is composed of Union and La Grande men principally, and work has been in progress on it for several months.

The report that oil has actually been struck is seemingly authentic, trainmen coming in from the east having seen parties from Vale who verify the report.

James Wright, the prominent and well known stockman of North Yakima, who is well known in this county, died at his North Yakima home on Tuesday of this week after but a brief illness. Mr. Wright had purchased sheep in this county for a number of years and was popular and well liked by all who knew him. EXPOSITION IS UNFOLDING.

Work on Seattle Grounds and Buildings Is Being Rushed.

Seattle, Feb. 27.--Nearly a thousand persons visit the site of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition every fine day to inspect the work which is rapidly progressing on the grounds and buildings.

The first of the big exhibit palaces that will be completed will be the manufactures building which has reached the stage where the roof will be placed into position next week. Already much of the ornamental staff work for this building has been finished and is being placed in position.

The agricultural building, a twin structure to the manufactures building, is not far behind her sister in progress, as its walls are now being erected.

The emergency hospital will have its last finishing touches applied within the next two weeks and then a complete hospital corps will be installed in the buildings to take care of anyone hurt or sick on the grounds.

Work has begun on the auditorium fine arts palace and machinery hall. These three structures will be erected for permanent use and will be handsome in design. Buff brick with terra cotta trimmings will be used in their construction. After the exposition closes they will be used by the University of Washington for educational purposes.

The fisheries and mines buildings will soon be started. These two buildings will be similar in size and will stand in the main picture of the exposition. The fire department station will be commenced within the next 10 days and just as soon as it is finished a complete, up to date fire apparatus with a competent company will be installed to protect the buildings from fire which they are under construction.

The contract for the Oregon building will be the first one let for a state building. Bids for this work are now being called for.

O. R. & N. Map Issued.

What is undoubtedly the clearest railroad map of the northwest ever issued is the new one which General Passenger Agent William McMurray of the O. R. & N. company, has just compiled. This map, showing the states of Washington, Oregon and Idaho and portions of British Columbia, Montana, California, Nevada and Utah, has been compiled by the passenger department of the O. R. & N. It shows the company's rail lines, water lines, projected and connecting lines and lines under construction. Stage lines and trails through the forests and the so-called desert lands of the western part of the state are all clearly marked. In addition to this, forest reserves, Carey irrigation act projects and reclamation act projects are shown in various colors.

Bought Fine Car of the Forest.

What was, perhaps the finest carload of Grande Ronde raised horses that ever left here was shipped out from La Grande yesterday by O. H. Holcomb, of Seattle, says the La Grande Star. Mr. Holcomb arrived Saturday and made all the purchases within two days. The horses were Clydes and Percherons and ranged in weight from 1400 to 1600 pounds. All except one were geldings and the prices ranged from \$175 to \$200 per head.

Heavy Seat Sale for Paul Gilmore.

When the seat sale for "The Wheel of Love," which will be presented by Paul Gilmore at the Oregon theater tomorrow night, opened at the Pendleton Drug store at 10 o'clock this forenoon, over 20 people were in line at the drug store and within an hour after the sales opened practically all of the lower floor was sold. It is the heaviest sale and greatest rush experienced in Pendleton for some time and the attendance at the attraction tomorrow night will be a record breaker from all appearances now.

Bacon Goes Up in Smoke.

He woke up at midnight to discover the smokehouse in flames. The loss exceeds \$200. He had contracted the meat to E. M. & M. at 10 cents a pound.--Enterprise News-Record.
