Money in Poultry Raising.

Should any one doubt that poultry can be raised at a profit in the vicinity of Pullman, he should interview W. M. Priest, the well known poultryman of this place. Mr. Priest informed the Tribune this week that he received \$90 for his eggs during the month of January, the product of about 400 hens, says the Pullman Tribune.

He shipped the eggs to Spokane and received 40 cents a dozen for them during the time the price was 25 cents a dozen at this place. This month he believes the number of eggs will be greater than last, as the weather conditions have been more favorable. He estimates that it costs \$1 to feed a hen for a year when the greater part of the feed is purchased, but as he grows much of his feed, the cost is much less.

The average yield of a hen is 10 dozen eggs a year at an average price of 25 cents a dozen, leaving a clear profit of \$1.25 for each hen. However, Mr. Priest says that hens can be bred to produce 12 dozen and over eggs a year. He says for egg producers the white leghorns have given the best satisfaction of any strain.

Filipino Lad Dying at La Grande.

"Pedro," a young Filipino boy who has been at the Grande Ronde hospital for several months, is in a very critical condition and is not expected to survive the night, says the La Grande Star. Pedro is about 17 years of age and is the only native of the Philippine Islands who ever lived in La Grande.

He came to this country with Attorney George Cochran, to whom he became attached when the latter held a government position a few years ago at Manila. The friendship became so strong between the two that when Mr. Cochran left the islands for the United States Pedro came along with him. His health began to fail last fall and a few weeks ago he was placed in the hospital, where he would be enabled to receive medical care. From the time of his arrival at the institution he has been growing worse and his death is only a matter of a few hours.

Select Fair Grounds Site.

The committee appointed at the meeting of the Fair association and citizens last week have selected a 40-acre tract belonging to John McDonald and lying at the first turn of the road west of town and just north of John Womack's house, as the fair grounds. They will report at the call of the president. The grounds selected will admit of a fine race track and ball grounds as well as plenty of room for buildings and the best of camping ground.—Wallawa Sun.

ANGORA GOAT ASSOCIATION.

To Adopt Rules for Shearing, Grading and Baling Mohair.

Preliminary organization has been effected for the Southern Oregon Angora Breeders' association, with C. E. Harmon president and Charles M. serve secretary, says the Medford Southern Oregonian. Another meeting will be held in Grant's Pass on Saturday, February 29, when a constitution will be adopted, officers elected and rules and regulations governing shearing and the grading and baling of mohair adopted. The expense of marketing the mohair is to be borne by those shipping, each shipper paying his per cent of the amount, as is done by the members of the fruitgrowers' association.

The membership is open to Angora breeders in Rogue River and Umpqua valleys, and from the interest taken it is expected that about all of the owners of goats in Josephine, Jackson and Douglas counties will join. There are some 8000 goats in the three counties, nearly half owned in Josephine county.

As there will be only about a carload of mohair in southern Oregon this spring, it will all be shipped to Grant's Pass, where it will be baled and loaded. To enable the mohair from Jackson and Douglas counties to be shipped to Grant's Pass for loading, application has been made to the Southern Pacific for a special rate on these in transit shipments. There is a likelihood that this low rate will be granted, as the company has shown great interest in the development of the Angora industry along its lines.

southern limits of the city. It is located on what is known as the Leeper property and lies just to the south of the land which the company has platted and divided into five acre tracts. The orchard company is to be incorporated with a capital stock of \$30,000, divided into 300 shares, of a par value of \$100 each.

The Baker City Herald says that 1,000,000 pounds of Grant county wool will be hauled to Austin and shipped to Baker City for the sales days June 22 and July 11. And all this will be brought about on account of a small reduction in the rate on wool from that city to eastern points. Baker City will have to show an entirely different business spirit toward the people of the John Day valley before that city will be made the wool shipping point for this section. Shanks, Heppner, and Pendleton will no doubt continue to control this very important trade until a railroad is built through this county and then we will have a wool market at home.—Blue Mountain Eagle.
