WASHINGTON IS QUIET CITY TODAY

"MORNING AFTER" IS GENERAL APPEARANCE

Few Over-zealous Statesmen Are
Only Ones Who Seem to Be Up and
Doing—Belated Visitors Are Hurrying to Get Away While Local
Citizens Are Sleeping Late.

Washington, March 5.—The grim gray dawn of the morning after, found the national capital almost as quiet if not so deserted, as a haunted cemetery at midnight during the dark of the moon. Pallid as ghosts, worn and weary and with not a cheer left in them, hundreds of belated visitors are hurrying to the stations to board trains for home. Washingtonians are sleeping late this morning, business is almost at a standstill, and those whose occupations force them to be up and doing wear the stupid air of those who celebrated over-much on that grand and glorious yesterday that marked the passing of Roosevelt and the arrival of Taft. The decorations of inauguration day look sadly torn and dragged this morning.

Despite the "tired feeling" so prevalent today, there are not a few statesmen who are already considering the future of the new administration and the things to be accomplished by the legislators, and among these the principal topic of conversation is the special session of the new sixty-first congress which will convene ten days hence.

Many Congressmen Remain.
Although a majority of the members of both branches of the national legislature have gone home to rest during the intervening interval, many of the leaders will stay in Washington to discuss with the new president the plans for the special session.

Unless present signs fail, dog days will find congressmen sweltering over tariff schedules instead of toying with long glasses filled with ice and straws on the verandas of summer resorts.

There has never been a general tariff revision bill framed and passed in less than 131 days. In addition to this congress has got to be reorganized. This is going to take some time. A speaker must be elected, committees framed up and other preliminary work done.

Speaker Cannon has refused to consider anything that would take his attention from congress before the last of July, and it is even intimated that he has a suspicion that the special session may run right up to the opening of the next regular session in December. The attitude of the democrats is not going to help matters along any. With the insurgents, they propose to take all the time they want in discussing the various phases of the tariff bill. They may not have a bill of their own to offer, but they will have a few remarks about the one presented by the republicans. And the senate will probably not break its long established deliberative methods, when it gets hold of the bill.

Hasten Tariff Legislation.
Those who want the tariff legislation hastened are not losing opportunities to get information of the probable long session before the people. They hope to arouse the business interests which are waiting to see what the new tariff law will contain, to put pressure on members of congress to the end that the tariff schedules shall be established and business become normal again after the suspense of pending tariff legislation.

Then a steerage passenger who was weary of waiting stumbled over a roll of rugs, which immediately got into motion. Xavier had crawled into the roll. He was restored to his family and the ship, held up more than an hour, was permitted to proceed to dock.

FEEDING ON OAK LEAVES

Livestock in Portion of Texas Get
Nothing Else to Eat.

San Antonio, Tex., Mar. 5.—The protracted drought which has held Plano county in its grasp since early last fall, has reduced stockmen to the extremity of chopping leaf-laden branches from trees to provide food for their starving cattle. The grass has withered and blown away, leaving the prairies almost bare. Water is scarce and the cattle dying.

A prominent stockman from that county says that the cowboys have discarded the lariat and spurs and armed themselves with axes for the new and novel work.

The oak trees, by reason of their deep, piercing roots, have preserved their greenness throughout the drought and have meant thousands of dollars to the stricken stockmen.

ROMAN CATHOLIC CONGRESS FOR MONTREAL

Rome, Mar. 5.—Announcement was made today that a great world wide Roman Catholic Congress will be held in Montreal next year. The Eucharistic sessions will feature the gathering and will attract influential prelates from all over the world.

The Congress will probably be held during the month of September, and will be divided into two great sections one deliberating in the English tongue while the official language of the second section will naturally be the French tongue. Although as at London there will be papers read and speeches made in other tongues besides English and French it is understood that the representatives from the Latin states, so-called, will, as much as possible, use the French language.

Montreal, therefore, is particularly well adapted for such a function for there are perhaps more people who understand both the English and French languages here than in any other city of its size in the world.

Philadelphia, Mar. 5.—"It's too bad, those shoes are ruined," said 5-year-old Raymond Michaels of 2047 Wakeling street, Frankford, when a trolley car cut off three toes on his right foot.

The lad had been playing near the corner of Torresdale avenue and Hawarth street, when he was struck by the car. He narrowly escaped death, his foot being caught beneath the wheels.

He was picked up and hurried in a patrol wagon to the Frankford Hospital. Although the foot was streaming with blood and his agony was frightful, the child never whimpered.

At the hospital part of the foot was amputated without recourse to an anesthetic. He won the reputation among the nurses, doctors and other patients at the hospital of being the bravest child ever brought there.
