MAYOR OF THE TOWN IS AN ALIEN ENEMY

Queer State of Affairs Develops in Michigan City, Indiana.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 26.—Fred C. Miller is mayor-elect of Michigan City, Ind., but in the eyes of the law he is an alien enemy. That's because he failed to take all the steps necessary to become an American citizen. He declared his intention of doing so in 1912 but had not finished the process when the war began. Then it was too late.

Under the laws of Indiana, however, he has the right to vote, and a voter in this state can hold a municipal office. But even so, the mayor-elect could not enter the barred zone, as proclaimed by the president, and as the city hall is in the barred zone he had to get a permit from the United States marshal before he could go there in connection with his coming official business.
