reaching the highest ideals of the solalist without interfering with those igrts.

it is the duty of a demorratic govmajority; but the majority must re spect the rights of individuals. Individuals have a right to the profucts of heir own labor, and a right to en gage in production in any way they
please that does not interfere with the equal rights of others; they may eith labor independently, or co-operate and when a majority decides chat the
government should engage in producion, why not?
it is not necessary to tax all the ndustries, and it is not necessary to interfere with the rights of those who prefer to carry on business in then wn way.
