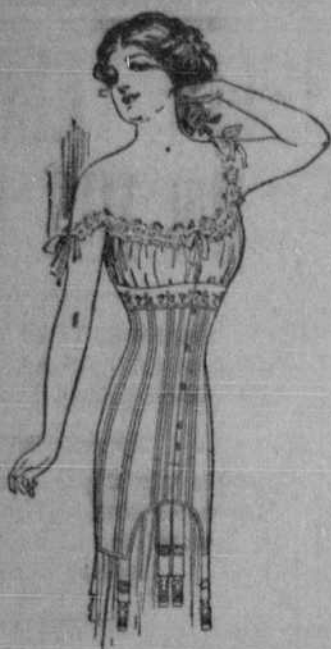

### RED CROSS STAMPS.

Washington, April 6.—The American Red Cross society today ordered 75,000,000 official Red Cross Christmas seals for use this year. The design is very different from those heretofore issued. In the center is a portrait of Santa Claus with the words "American Red Cross" at the top, and "1912" at the bottom.

In each of the four corners is the insignia of the society.

Last year 98,000,000 seals were printed. The contractors will be ready to supply 25,000,000 more if they are needed.

### COAL FOR PANAMA.

New York, April 6.—The Panama railway awarded the contract for coal at the Panama canal for the next two years, to the Pocahontas Fuel company of Pocahontas, Va., today. The contract calls for the delivery of up to 550,000 tons a year at \$2.79 a gross ton, with a reduction of 5 cents a ton should the price of coal decline during the second year.
