Hapovia, the winner of the six-furlong event a few afternoons ago at laklawn, yesterday was never forward at any part of the mile and a sixteenth event, and was beaten easily by Woodstone in the feature at Oaklawn. Hanovia had been installed the favorite, and from the last appear ance was apparently not only a good printer but a distance event perform er of rare merit. Woodstone, how ever, was much the best the way the race was run, and won rather handily Thornhill was kept forward all the way and finished third, and Julia L. was used most of the route for a pacemaker, after which she retired. Little String, Progressive, Pockichoo and Mico Girl were favorites to justify the faith the talent had pinned to their chances. Jockey Crump rode three of the winners of the afternoon. and James Arthur sent two of the winners to the post. The track had dried out many clously after the heavy rainfall, and some horseman proclaim it the most wonderful track in the country in this respect. By this afternoon it is presumed than the course will be fast.

One of the first racing incidents of the meeting to mar the running of an event came yesterday afternoon when Greenwood stumbled at the bar rier and unseated Jockey Stearns. The boy went over the horse's head but was not hurt. Greenwood had been a well followed second choice. however, and some of the talent re ceived a harder jolt than Jockey Stearns did when he toppled over.
