A FEW WORDS ABOUT CANNING.

Notwithstanding the fact that thousands of home canners are in use the impression seems to prevail that to do this work in a commercial way requires a special building and a corps of high-priced help.

Neither is it necessary to have a large acreage of the same varieties of fruits and vegetables to make a canning factory profitable.

The farmer with a home canner preserves his fruits, tomatoes, beans, sweet potatoes, etc., in whatever quantities he happens to have. While it is no doubt preferable to have large quantities to justify a large investment, the product is no better than that put up under farm conditions.

There are plenty of empty buildings in Hot Springs that would be suitable for the business that could be procured for a nominal rent. A tank 336 feet, heated by gas and brick set, costing possibly \$50, would do the work until another or larger canner became necessary. A tank of this size with four persons could can at least 1,000 cans of tomatoes and other things in proportion.

I asked a grocer the other day if he would buy some canned tomatoes of me if I put some up. He said he had bought his tomatoes. I asked when they would be delivered and he said November. No 2 tomatoes are selling now at \$1.35 per dozen and No. 3 at \$2.25. Our crop will be in July. There will be quantities of these goods consumed between the time we can our crop and the time the Baltimore goods get in. The price of tomatoes in ordinary years is about 90c per dozen for the No. 3 cans. The cans may cost a cent a piece more than normal, but that would leave \$1.25 per dozen above normal prices. The people of Foreman, Ark., some years ago built a canning factory. It was a perfectly good factory, equipped with everything to do business, but stood for years without putting up a can. While they had the plant and a certain amount of staff to can they had not made arrangements to finance the deal, and as their bankers were not accustomed to that kind of paper the business failed before it started.

The financial conditions in Hot Springs today are different to what they were in Little River county five years ago. There is plenty of money for legitimate business. A car of cans is worth what they cost. If a farmer had fruit or vegetables suitable to can he had better take a due bill from the canning company for their value than to lose them. The minute the cans are filled they can be sold at the market and the acceptance handled. The only actual cash needed for the first turnover would be the labor.
While I was on the farm I put up
