WITNESSES ENGAGE THEIR MT. IDA TRIPS

PROSECUTING ATTORNEY RANDOLPH WILL COOPERATE TO RELEASE WITNESSES EARLY

Witnesses and other who will have to attend the Dr. J. W. Smith case at Mt. Ida next Wednesday are making their engagements through T. S. Green for passenger service to and from the Montgomery county seat, and the schedule as arranged will be facilitated by the cooperation of Prosecuting Attorney B. H. Randolph, who will be willing to consult with and cooperate with witnesses attending the trial that they may not be held longer at Mt. Ida than necessary, nor be forced to go there until they are needed. This phase of the cooperation will also take care of the danger of overcrowded quarters at Mt. Ida during the progress of the trial.

It is anticipated that the first day, Wednesday, will be taken up largely in the matter of securing a jury. The prosecuting attorney will on personal request, excuse all but the first witnesses to be put on the stand for the state from attending Wednesday. This does not mean they can arbitrarily avoid their summons to be at Mt. Ida Wednesday morning when the case is called, for their names will be called in the court room, and if they are not there, or have not made their arrangements for attendance one day later with the prosecuting attorney, and secured his release for that particular day, they will be subjected to fine for contempt of court in not obeying the court summons. Like arrangements perhaps can be made by witnesses for the defense, if they call on attorneys for the defense, and through them, and not otherwise, get excused from attendance on either Wednesday or the earlier part of the Thursday session.

The apparent schedule of the proceeding is that Wednesday will be given to selecting the jury and outlining the case before the jury by attorneys for the state and the defense, that Thursday will perhaps all be consumed in the presentation of the state's case, and that Friday the defense will have its witnesses on the stand; and that the arguments will be conducted Saturday and the case given to the jury. This outline is not definite in any form, as the case may proceed much faster, in which event all the responsibility on court attendants for not being present when wanted is with them, only when the prosecuting attorney, of the defense might assume that responsibility for the accommodation of the witness.

RECTOR FUNERAL TODAY.

The body of the late Alcorn Rector will reach Hot Springs this afternoon over the Rock Island at 3:55, and will be transferred from the depot to the Hollywood cemetery, where it will be laid to rest. Alcorn Rector was the son of Colonel Elias W. and Mrs. Rector, one of the oldest families of Hot Springs, and of Arkansas. His father until his death bore the distinction always of the foremost citizen of Hot Springs in general affairs. Alcorn Rector was a product of this city, was educated in the schools here, and became quite an inventive genius. In recent years he has resided in New York and Chicago. His health was good until about three years ago when he suffered a breakdown from over work.

The body will be accompanied to the city by Miss Amelia Rector, sister of the deceased, and from Little Rock by Juba Rector, a cousin. James Alcorn Rector a brother, will arrive this morning from his home in St. Louis. The services at cemetery will be conducted by Rev. F. M. Wylie of the Orange Street Presbyterian church. The pall bearers are all schoolboy friends of the deceased, and are as follows: Dr. L. R. Ellis, Walter W. Little, Ernest Latta, Judge Scott Wood, Frank Stritt and George P. Leatherman.

KANSAS CITY COMES STRONG.

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 8.—Kansas City today exceeded its self-imposed quota of four million dollars daily in the fourth Liberty loan today when subscriptions totaling \$4,628,950 were reported. Today's figures brought subscriptions for the first two days of bond selling here up to \$7,759,850. The city's quota is \$22,000,000. If the present rate of subscriptions is maintained the city should obtain its quota by the end of this week.

ARKANSAS SECOND IN DISTRICT.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 8.—The eighth (St. Louis) federal district up to last night had raised \$152,063,650, or 58.5 percent of its quota of \$260,000,000 of the fourth Liberty loan. St. Louis with \$36,302,950 has 47.8 percent of its quota. Only subscriptions on which first payments have been made are announced. Indiana has raised 91 percent of its quota, having \$17,098,200; Arkansas has \$16,267,450; 68 percent; Illinois \$19,416,350; 47 percent; Kentucky \$25,465,000; 63 percent; Mississippi \$7,877,700; 28 percent; Missouri (not including St. Louis) \$19,884,650; 44 percent; Tennessee \$81,155,000; 44 percent; St. Louis county \$1,500,550; 81 percent.

W. A. LEWIS, Jr., DEAD.

W. A. Lewis left last evening for Gettysburg, Pa., in response to a message of the death of his son, W. A. Lewis, Jr., which occurred at the camp Colt at Gettysburg. The young man was to have received his officer's commission in a few days having been given preference over a class of 15 young men. Mr. Lewis has the sympathy of friends in his bereavement.

GOMPERTS WARNS ITALIANS AGAINST GERMAN TRICKERY

Rome, Oct. 8.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, who is here with a delegation of American labor leaders, strongly denounced the recent peace move of the Central powers, saying that the new German maneuvers seek to weaken the unity of the democratic nations and lessen their fighting spirit.

COMPLETE DETAILS OF PATHFINDING TOUR

MEN OF THE HIGHEST INTEGRITY WILL START OUT NEXT WEEK TO SELECT ROUTES.

Every detail of the Pathfinding tour to inspect the various routes for the Bankhead National Highway from Memphis, Tenn., via Little Rock to El Paso, Texas, has been carefully worked out and announced by Secretary J. A. Rountree, who has charge of the party. President Plowman, in accordance with instructions of the Bankhead Association, given at Little Rock April 18-19, has appointed members of this commission coming from the States of Virginia, Georgia, Alabama and Tennessee. The gentlemen selected are of the highest character and are successful business men. Secretary of Agriculture Houston has designated Morris O. Eldridge of the office of Public Roads and Survey Engineering to represent the United States government on this commission. He is considered one of the ablest road engineers in the United States.

President Plowman will accompany the Pathfinding Commission and an effort is being made to have Senator Bankhead join the party en route as many requests are coming for him to visit various points in Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

The inspection of the Pathfinding Commission will cover over 3,000 miles and will require four weeks' time. They will inspect two routes between Memphis and Little Rock; two routes between Little Rock and Fort Smith; one route between Little Rock and Hot Springs to Texarkana; two routes in Oklahoma, two in New Mexico and three in Texas. Letters and telegrams received by Secretary Rountree show that the Pathfinders will be accorded every courtesy possible and much enthusiasm is being aroused over the coming of the party. The commission will reach Memphis on the afternoon of October 14th, when they will be entertained at the Chicago hotel by the Crittenden, Arkansas, and Cross Country Association.

SECRETARY OF STATE ACCEPTS JUDGE JAMES L. GRAHAM'S PETITION

NAME WILL BE CERTIFIED OUT AS AN INDEPENDENT CANDIDATE FOR CIRCUIT JUDGE.

Judge James L. Graham went to Little Rock yesterday afternoon for a consultation with Attorney General and Secretary of State relative to getting his name on the ticket as an independent candidate for Circuit Judge.

The Attorney General held that any one who had been a candidate in the Democratic Primary could not be a candidate in the General Election unless he had renounced his party affiliation with the Democrats. After his ruling the Secretary of State required Judge Graham to file an affidavit setting out that he was not running as a democrat but as an independent, after which he gave him the following letter:

Hon. Jas. L. Graham—
Hot Springs, Ark.

Dear Sir: You having secured the required number of signatures to a petition to have your name certified out as an independent candidate for Circuit Judge, for the 18th Judicial District, composed of Garland and Montgomery counties, and also filed an affidavit, announcing you were no longer affiliated with the democratic party, shall certify your name out on the ticket to be voted on at the general election, Nov. 5th, 1918.

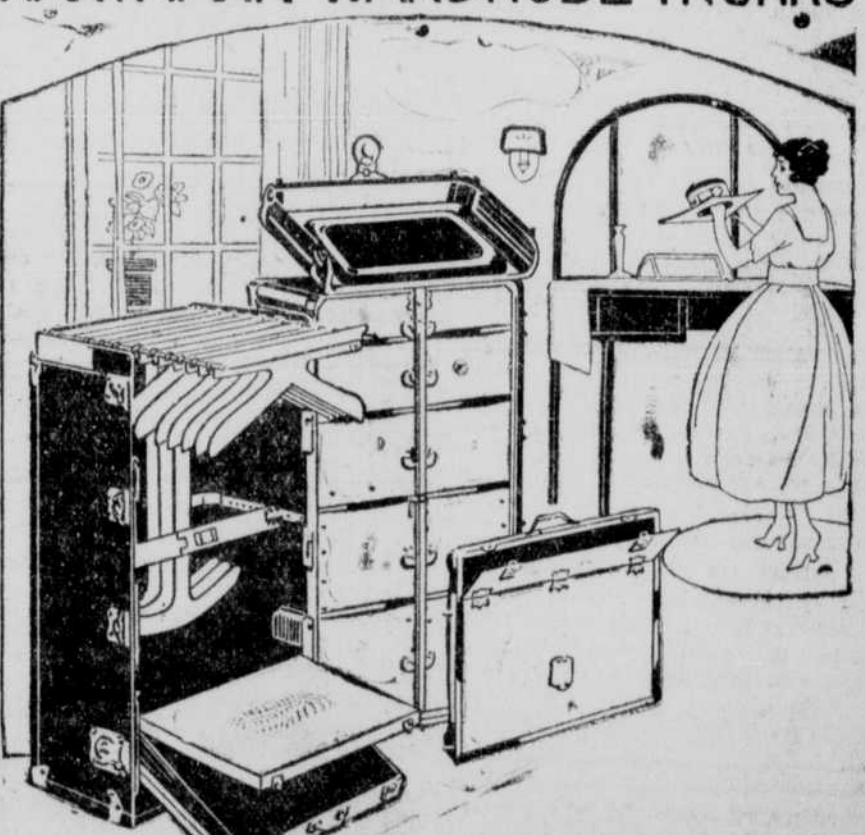
