

ORDER 5 CLOSED FOR PROFITEERING

FOOD ADMINISTRATION ORDERS PENALTIES ON FIRMS FOR VIOLATIONS OF RULES.

Very Small Technical Violation in Instance of Two Others Covered By Reprimand—Other Cases Under Investigation.

The first meeting of the Garland County Executive Committee of the United States Food Administration was held at the office of the County Food Administrator Howlett on Friday afternoon December 6th.

Eight merchants were summoned, whose sales showed that they had charged in excess of the per centage of profit allowed by the administration on staple articles of food.

The penalties adjudged follow: S. A. Burroughs, Hobson and Sumner, place of business closed for two days, December 26 and 27, also the display of the government food sign.

MATT PICCHI VISITS WORLD FAMED PLACES

HOT SPRINGS BOY WHO WENT INTO WAR WORK WRITES INTERESTINGLY TO BROTHER

Matt Picchi, who went from Hot Springs into the war work under the direction of the Knights of Columbus has written to his brother here of the many things of interest he has seen and heard, in the following communication:

Dear Brother: I am well have not been sick one minute. We had a very tough time crossing the sea on account of the storms and had to turn back for three days or else we would be swamped. We came in a very small vessel and the other ships in our convoy thought many times that we had come under or were out of sight of them many times. There were ships in our convoy carrying troops Red Cross nurses and K. of C. During the trip one secretary died and was buried at sea. It was very sad the vessel came to a standstill we had no chaplain on our ship, the captain said the prayers for the dead and the body slid into the ocean in the middle of the sea. We saw 7 or 8 icebergs. The waves were very high and once went over the ship and came down into the

cabin. We were in danger many times and wore our life preservers constantly. I did take my clothes off but one night after we left Quebec. The day before we reached Plymouth, England, where we landed we were met by a number of torpedo boats destroyers and then we felt perfectly safe. There is a beautiful harbor there. We left there about 4 p. m. and reached London about 1 a. m. and went to Hotel Cosmo where we stayed about three days. Did not like London and was glad to leave. We took the train to South Hampton and the boat to Havre and from there to Paris by train. Paris is a beautiful city, one of the most beautiful cities in the world. Stayed there about two weeks. Myself and three other secretaries are here to open up headquarters in the Eternal City. Have been busy and unable to write except odd moments. We are to open up the first K. of C. headquarters in Italy. Four of us. It is a great honor and is the best thing to be offered over here. We are finding it quite difficult to find suitable or in fact any headquarters. I visited St. Peter's yesterday and the Vatican. One of the guards gave us an orange from the trees in the garden. They are green and I hope that they will keep until I get home, but I suppose not. It would be quite a novelty to bring some fruit from the Vatican. St. Peter is a massive beautiful cathedral. The galleries in the Vatican are the most beautiful I have ever seen.

The paintings are superb and the sculpture wonderful. I visited Versailles near Paris, Louis XIV Palace and gardens and thought it the finest I ever saw which it was in fact until I saw the painting in the Vatican and now Louis XIV must take a back seat. We were in the mountain section of Italy before coming to Rome where there was lots of snow but here it is just like summer. The place that we are stopping at has lemons and oranges in the yard not very far from St. Peter. There are not very many Americans here. Much different than Paris as it is crowded with American soldiers. I don't know how long I will be here and hope it won't be long until I will be on my way back home. I have never seen any one from home yet. Well Joe I hope this letter will find you and all the

brothers o. k. Give them all my best regards and Father Carroll, also will drop you a card once in a while.

P. S.—K. of C. is doing some good work. We are having some trouble getting opened up. I will sure have lots to tell you when I get home as I cannot explain in letter.
