

IMMIGRATION PLANS

SOUTHWESTERN RAILROADS TO EXPLOIT THEIR TERRITORY AND ATTRACT EUROPEANS.

St. Louis, May.—It has developed that more than a half million dollars and hundreds of special agents will be employed this year by five big railroads in an extraordinary effort to exploit and populate the Southwest. Plans are already completed by the Missouri Pacific, Iron Mountain, Frisco, Rock Island and M., K. and T., contemplating expenditures averaging 20 to 25 per cent greater than those of 1906, and their joint endeavors are expected to add nearly 400,000 to the present population of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri and Louisiana in the next twelve months.

As part of the campaign at least two systems—the Frisco-Rock Island and the Missouri Pacific—will invade Europe for the purpose of attracting to territory along their lines desirable classes of agricultural workers. The Frisco-Rock Island has established a Bureau of Immigration in Rome, in addition to that already maintained in London, and will shortly inaugurate an agency in Zurich, Switzerland. Other parts of Europe, particularly Germany, will be thoroughly canvassed later. C. B. Schmidt, the Frisco's commissioner of immigration was in St. Louis last Friday gathering views and statistics illustrative of the agricultural advantages of the Ozark sections of Missouri and Arkansas, where it is the intention to plant colonies of Swiss gardeners, dairymen and wine growers.

Insurance Tangle.

New York, May.—Sensational results have quickly followed the inquiry by the district attorney's office into the recent election of directors of the New York Life Insurance Company.

George P. Scrugham, secretary of the International Policyholders Committee, which inspired the present investigation, making grave charges against those who conducted the election, was himself arrested at Albany and put aboard a train for New York. Scrugham is charged with conspiracy, and he was the third man identified with the International Policyholders Committee to be taken into custody since noon Tuesday. The others are Charles Stirrup and Charles F. Carrington. These two were not members of the committee, but were employed

as watchers by the committee at the election. Stirrup was a watcher at the directors' election of the Mutual Life Insurance Company, while Carrington acted in a similar capacity at the New York Life election. They are specifically charged with having "unlawfully conspired together for the perversion and obstruction of the due administration of the laws of the state of New York with relation to the election of the directors of the New York Life Insurance Company."

\$920,798,143.

Washington, May.—According to the volume on appropriations made, new offices created, etc., during the last session of Congress, which has just been completed by Thomas P. Cleaves, clerk of the Senate Committee on Appropriations, and James C. Courts, clerk of the House Committee on Appropriations, the total appropriations for the session were \$920,798,143. In addition to these specific appropriations, contracts were authorized for public works requiring appropriations aggregating \$67,934,349, of which \$49,000,000 is for river and harbor improvements and almost \$16,000,000 for battleships, torpedo boats, etc. The largest appropriation carried by any one measure is \$22,091,193 by the postoffice bill.

Criticize Carnegie.

Berlin, May.—There was a general debate in the Reichstag Tuesday on Germany's foreign relations and incidentally Andrew Carnegie's recent reference to the decision between war and peace being in the hands of Emperor William was criticised and classed as a distortion of facts. Speakers of various parties pointedly suggested to Chancellor Von Beulow that Germany should take no part in the discussion of the limitation of armaments at The Hague peace conference. The chancellor replied that Germany did not object to letting other powers discuss the matter, but would hold aloof.

Lowest Temperature.

San Antonio, Tex., May.—The average temperature was the lowest for April 30 recorded by the federal Weather Bureau in the twenty-one years of its operation here. The average temperature was 58, six degrees below that of April 30, 1903, which then established the record. The lowest temperature Tuesday, however, reached 45, one degree about the minimum temperature of April 30, 1903.

Chamois Skins from Sheep.
Chamois skins in a majority of cases, according to a United States consular report recently issued, are really an oil tanned sheep or lamb skin lining. The supply of skins from the chamois is very limited. Enough could not be obtained in a year to supply the United States for more than a single day, a fair average crop from Switzerland being only about 5,000 to 6,000 skins. The chamois skin is heavier than the skin of the sheep or lamb, and much coarser. For strength and durability the chamois is preferable, but for ordinary use and appearance the oil-tanned sheepskin lining would, in most instances, be preferred.


