

TO COLONIZE LINCOLN COUNTY.

Great Irrigation Scheme for Muddy Valley—Homes for 10,000 People.

Long years ago Eldorado Canyon and Pioche brought Lincoln county before the public as a great producer of mineral wealth.

Now comes the announcement from F. R. McNamee, of Delamar, that he has completed arrangements for a big irrigation scheme which will result in placing many thousands of acres in the muddy valley under cultivation.

Seven miles below Moapa, at what is termed the Narrows, there is a natural reservoir in the shape of a deep canyon.

Collector Baker is Discharged by Wire. Collector of Customs Edwin Baker of the Port of Nogales was dismissed from office last Friday evening by a telegraphic command from Washington, D. C.

Baker forwarded his resignation as collector to the secretary of the treasury about two weeks ago, but the resignation was not accepted and the collector was summarily dismissed.

E. L. Griswold who has been deputy collector for some time past was directed by Secretary Shaw to take charge of the Nogales office.

About three weeks ago a couple of special inspectors arrived in Nogales to investigate Collector Baker. Immoral charges had been made against him. He was accused a couple of years ago of a serious offense but it was not proved in a subsequent investigation.

Yaquis Rob Train and Murder Escort. Five teamsters and several Mexican soldiers killed by Yaqui Indians is the death record of a raid on a wagon train belonging to the Cieneguita Copper Company last week.

The train consisted of eight wagons and was loaded with supplies for the camp. The freight outfit was ambushed by a large force of Indians in a sand draw.

The report was confirmed by Geo. Beebe, president of the Cieneguita Copper Company who passed through here on his way to Los Angeles.

NEW MEXICO NEWS

Company D, New Mexico National Guard, of Silver City, Grant county, has been re-organized and many new men have enlisted.

Kansas forty-five years ago became a state, and there was not a mile of railroad and but one telegraph line, namely to Leavenworth, in existence, and still there are senators and representatives who would deny statehood to New Mexico today.

A cave-in of a hill of slag at the Comanche smelter at Silver City last week buried the briquetting plant of the company and damaged much valuable machinery.

Deputy Marshal Fred Fornhof, who investigated the confession of Frank Bell, who claimed he was the man who killed Col. Chavez, found that the man was crazy, and on the verge of delirium tremens, when he made the confession.

Four dollars per head for graded sheep have been offered of late by buyers in this territory but no sellers were found. This is quite a contrast from the unlamented days of the Cleveland administration, which graded sheep of the same age and kind would hardly bring \$1.25 per head.—New Mexican.

It is also quite a contrast with a few weeks ago, when the territorial board of equalization said that sheep should only be assessed at \$1.35 per head, and the board attempted to put other property on a basis of sixty per cent. of its cash value.—Liberal.

R. W. Thompson, of Simon, a Southern Pacific section foreman, while out on his section, between Simon and Steins, last week, discovered a pool of blood alongside the track. On examination he found a trail where a body had been dragged, and following this up found the dead body of a man about two hundred yards from the track.

Frank Bell, the confessed murderer of Col. J. Francisco Chavez, of New Mexico, was recently arrested at Prescott. The murder occurred a little over a year ago, and was a most cowardly and cold-blooded affair.

PATTERSON OF COLORADO.

The Breezy Western Senator Introduces a Resolution Setting Forth His Independence.

Senator Patterson of Colorado, caused a sensation in the Senate by introducing a resolution relative to the rights of Senators in voting on treaties.

Patterson's resolution recited that the action of a Democratic caucus indicating to Senators how they should vote was a plain violation of the spirit and intent of the Constitution of the United States; that each Senator was entitled to one vote and any attempt to coerce him was an invasion of the rights of the State; that for any Senator to vote otherwise than as his sense of duty dictates degrades his high office and assails the dignity and stand of the Senate.

Lodge had prepared a resolution similar to that of Patterson, declaring that a treaty like the Dominican should not be made the subject of party action, but withheld it when he heard of Patterson's proposed resolution.

In many mining camps of the southwest dynamite is being used by the Mexican miners, it is said, in a new and altogether startling way. Many of the peons are what is known as dynamite snarl.
