MAY BE MORE TROUBLE.

Boers are Restless and Complain that They Were Deceived By Officers.

PRETORIA, July 15.—The settlement of the annexed territory is not being accomplished without considerable friction. This is especially noticeable in the bitter hatred and persecution on the part of the Boers who stayed in the field to the end of the war against the Boers who served as British scouts. It is said that some of these national scouts have been shot or beaten. So intense is the feeling that many of the burghers who fought consistently to the end distinguished themselves from those who surrendered during the war by wearing a green badge. The Transvaal and Free State colors are also freely worn and the custom is encouraged by the Dutch who did not take an active part in the war. Many of the burghers declare they were induced to agree to surrender by the false representations of their leader, who painted the terms too thoroughly.

Discordant claims are numerous and any attempt to place the burghers who surrendered during the war in authority over those who fought throughout the war will conceivably result in a renewal of hostilities. The majority of the Boers have apparently in no way abandoned their nationality, and some of them preach the advisability of opening Dutch schools so as to keep alive their nationality. The whole situation so bristles with difficulties that there are not lacking those who doubt if the document signed May 31 was really the final settlement of the South African trouble.
