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### Thanksgiving Day.

After the custom of the fathers and agreeable to national and state mandates, the people of the whole country have set aside this day as a day of national thanksgiving. It is a fitting and appropriate ceremonial worthy of the great nation that commemorates the day. Let the nation give thanks. In all the wide land there is peace and plenty. The harvests have been abundant, the industries of the country have flourished. There has been neither famine nor pestilence, nor war, nor want. The farmer rejoices in a full granary, the storehouse of the nation is filled. The laborer has not been idle and the thrift that filled his dinner pail has furnished his household for the winter. If perchance there are among the idle and unthrifty any in want, out of the spirit of the day and the fullness of the larder, these too will be fed that they also will join in the national thanksgiving.

### The Open River.

The key to the freight rate situation in the Inland Empire lies in the open river proposition. With an open river to the sea, the question of cheaper transportation will be solved. If the railroads cannot lower rates to compete with water transportation over their roads as now constructed, they will be forced to build new lines of road on easier grades to lessen the cost of operating that they may compete successfully with the river transportation. The movement now inaugurated promises to concentrate the energies of all parties in interest in a plan to open this great water way. The aid of congress is to be invoked. To this end Idaho, Oregon and Washington will be solidly united. With a canal at the Dalles allowing free communication between lower river and the upper Snake and Columbia, the products of the interior could be moved to market at a reduced cost and every cent of the reduced price of transportation will be saved to the farmers of the great river basin. Here is a question of widespread interest, the proper solution of which will bring lasting benefit to the people of the great Inland Empire, tapped by the Snake and Columbia rivers.

The development of the timber resources of the upper Clearwater promises to give Lewiston a great industry in the creation of large lumbering plants erected for the purpose of manufacturing the product for the market. There are many points that favor the location of such an industry here. The open river is one giving easy transportation for the products to points along the great water way. This is a natural distributing center and the development of the future will only tend to make this location even more desirable for this feature alone. Again this is a banking and business center. The business interests of the great companies could be easily handled here. Supplies and equipment could be easily obtained and laid down here at a cost very advantageous to the operator. These and other reasons as practical in their bearing lead to the belief that Lewiston can, with proper effort, secure the location of one or more of the extensive lumbering plants

that will be put in to work up the resources of the Clearwater timber belt. Natural advantages favor Lewiston as a location and this, coupled with wide-awake business energy should secure the desired results.

Let the citizens of Lewiston give thanks, especially that a section at least of Main street has been redeemed by proper grading and paving and trust that when the big steam roller gets in operation, it may never cease till the remainder is in a like condition.

The river and harbor bill will be one of the urgent measures before congress in the coming short session. The appropriation for the Dalles canal comes up early, hence work toward that end must be pushed rapidly.
