TOWN TIDINGS.

Ex-Gov. Neil and family are at Hailey, where they propose to reside permanently.

The Caldwell Tribune favors the nomination of Ed. L. Curtis, late Secretary of the Territory, for Congress.

J. C. Wait Esq. of the law and collection firm of Wood & Wait, Boise city, is making a visit here and possibly may conclude to stay.

Patterson & Reese, contractors on the railroad construction between Ketchum and the bridge, paid off their hands yesterday. They will complete their contract this week.

Yesterday was the warmest day of the season. The thermometer on Main street went up to about 80 degrees in the shade. This would be considered cool almost anywhere else.

The Justice's Court was busy yesterday taking testimony in the case of Moore vs. F. M. Wilmuth. It involves a claim of \$90. The parties are of Gale-lena. Hawley & Dow appear for the plaintiff; Prickett & Lamb for defendant. Trial by the Court without a jury. Homer Stahl, attorney for the rail-road company, left yesterday for Hai-ley. He was here several days. He in-formed us yesterday that he had com-pleted the purchase for the company of the right of way for the track, and for the depot and other works in and near Ketchum.

The driver of one of Dickinson's teams, whose name we did not ascertain, came from Vienna yesterday with a badly mutilated hand. It was occasioned by his hand being caught in the links of one of the chains attached to the team. One finger was broken off, and another badly injured. Dr. Lewis operated on his hand last evening, and put it in better shape.

Ketchum.

The correspondent of the Salt Lake Tribune, who recently visited this place, writes a very flattering letter to that journal regarding the condition and prosper-ity of Ketchum. He summarizes in in the following extract:

"One year ago an Episcopal church known as St. Marks was organized, and on Sunday T. E. Clohecy, R. C. West, G. W. Griffin, T. W. Gillette and A. Criswell were elected as a missionary committee. The society has two fine lots upon which they will build next spring. It will be thus seen that this place, so short a time ago a wilderness and afterwards a wild mining camp, is rapidly crystalizing into a moral and religious community. Ketchum is very prettily situated for a town, the flat and surroundings being very favorable for a place of abode. Wood River, Warm Springs and Trail creeks, with their narrow valleys, all center here and the valley widens out into a fine basin where the sun shines brightly and the winds are tempered to give a pleasant climate. Water and timber are abundant and convenient."

"The Philadelphia company are credit-ed with being the prime movers in bringing the railway extension here, and with buying bonds of the road to the extent of \$108,000 to secure the building of the road. This investment of the company shows their faith in the country and road, while it increases their property here to a great extent, and they estimate that they will soon have their money back in the reduction of transportation of their ores, bullion, fluxes and coke. The cost of coke will be reduced thirty per cent, and iron ore and lime about fifty per cent. Iron ore for the flux will be supplied from the mines in Tintic Utah.

The business men here are energetic and enterprising, the merchants carry large stocks, and appear to be prosper-ing. Utah is largely represented in this class of men, and also among the mining men."

Territorial News.

News-Miner.

Up to the 10th of the present month, nineteen car-loads in excess of the number at the same period last year, have been shipped East from this sta-tion. Considering the lateness of the season, and other hinderances, this is a gratifying record. From this time on until winter, shipments will be heaviest ever known for the same period in this region.

Yesterday the Commissioners met at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, and after allow-ing Sheriff Furey's bill for the last quarter (\$5,200), adjourned until Aug-ust 6th.

Of the railroad delegation: About 3 o'clock they left for the East. Before going, and while at the station here, the petition signed by a large number of our citizens, praying that the new depot might be constructed nearer town, and of sufficient capacity to ac-commodate the speedy handling of the increasing freight and passenger traffic, was presented to Superintendent Blick-enderfer, who said he would present it to the Directors at once. President Adams wished to make a longer stay at this end of the line, but having an ap-pointment with the officials of the O. R. & N. at Burnt River, he was obliged to hasten on his way.

Boise Democrat.

Certain movements seem to indicate a partial or total military abandonment of Fort Boise.

Fitzgibbons, the soldier who was twice tried for rape, but escaped the civil authorities through disagreed ju-ries, was afterwards found guilty by a court martial at Boise Barracks. So Col. Stone informed district attorney Cahalan; but the final disposition of Fitzgib-bons, Tom had not learned. Cahalan deserves credit for his efforts to secure the wretch's conviction, and came with-in one of it in the second trial. The military, however, which are governed by cold facts, redeemed the community by finding him guilty.

Pierson, who killed "Johnny Behind-the-Rocks," will be hung next Friday, unless Gov. Bunn takes some action in reference to the petitions in favor of commutation of the sentence.

In Ada county, George Frost, Orrie Cole and Charles H. Robinson are seek-ing nomination for Sheriff at the hands of the Democratic convention. Hon. John West announces himself as an in-dependent candidate for the same posi-tion.

Isaac Culp has been accused of being a candidate for Sheriff, but denies that his ambition lies in that direction.

Hon. T. F. Singiser is now in Boise city.

The Inter-Idaho of Tuesday says: "This morning the calendar will be per-emptorily called, for the last time, and all cases thereon will be called for trial or disposed of until the next court."

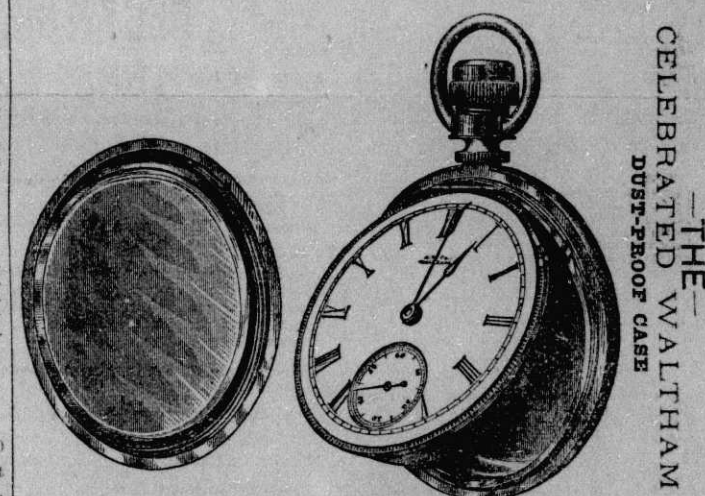
