NORTH IDAHO POLITICS.

The Lewiston papers—the News and Teller—are exchanging hot shots over the Congressional nomination, the Teller favoring Singiser, and the News anyone else. A number of cards have been published favoring the nomination of different parties from the North, all of them apparently based upon the idea that North Idaho must go to Washington Territory, and that the Delegate from this Territory must favor that annexation. Anyone opposing this consolidation must be tabooed. Last of all comes a proposition in the Singiser organ to call an independent convention of the people of the Northern counties to nominate some one "Who is an avowed annexationist, and a true man for the suffrage of every annexation vote in North Idaho in case neither of the conventions at Boise City have a plank in their platform favoring annexation." The Teller declares that "It is the manifest disposition of several men to stock the two conventions which meet at Boise City with anti annexation men, and the people of the North should be ready to manfully meet any such contingency."

One of the numerous signed papers "from the people" recommends A. Leland, editor of the Teller, for Delegate, or L. P. Brown. A Mr. Taylor is also out with a card endorsed by personal friends. Altogether it looks like a war of cards, taking in nearly all the voters beyond the Salmon river range of mountains. One would imagine that the entire election trouble is carried upon the shoulders of North Idaho.

The people of Idaho Territory are certainly very grateful for these evidences of patriotism; but we can scarcely appreciate the modesty that proposes to exclusively dictate a delegate for the Territory whose whole duty will be to knock it into pieces. Idaho needs a representative, and not a butcher. If this carving business once commences none can predict when or where it will stop. Washington may take the north, Oregon the west and Nevada the south. While such a sub-division might not be altogether obnoxious to many, it is certainly not the disposition of the people of either party to destroy Idaho Territory just yet. We have never known of a Territory that voluntarily and wilfully committed suicide, but this seems to be the aim and import of all this hub-bub up north.

As a Territorial delegate has no vote at most, all this squabble and contention around Lewiston looks such like a small tempest in a teapot.

Copper.

Twenty years ago the price of bar copper in New York was 55 cents per pound. To-day 14 cents is the outside asking price, and last week there were sales of Lake copper at 13 7-8 cents, equally good Arizona copper at 13 1-4 cents, and Colorado copper, smelted at Taunton, Mass., at 12 1-2 cents. These prices show a decline of 75 per cent in this article in the last two decades. The rates at present are the lowest ever known in the trade in this country. There is still a duty of 4 cents a pound on ingot copper, but it has failed to stem the downward tendency. The local product has been increased much more rapidly than the home demand.—Scientific American.

While attending the Missouri Press Association meeting recently held at Springfield I met Frank P. Blair, Jr., and he told the following very good story, which is worth repeating: On one of the many official excursions made by boat to Fortress Monroe and Chesapeake Bay, Chief Justice Waite, of the Supreme Court, Judge Hall, of North Carolina, and other dignitaries of the bench were participants. When the government steamer had fairly got out of the Potomac and into the Atlantic the sea was very rough and the vessel pitched fearfully. Judge Hall was taken violently with sickness.

As he was leaning over the side of the vessel and moaning aloud in his agony, the Chief Justice stepped gently to his side, and, laying a soothing hand on his shoulder, said: "My dear Hall, can I do anything for you? Just suggest what you wish." "I wish," said the seasick Judge, "Your honor would overrule this motion."—American Journalist.
