SPRING BUILDING ACTIVITIES START IN JEROME THIS WEEK

Last Tuesday ground was broken for the erection of an office building on the lots east of the News office. Messrs. Barnard Stillwell and E. D. Fischer are to erect a brick building with pressed brick front, size 25x52. The building is to be divided, one-half being used by Mr. Stillwell in conducting his real estate business.

Ground is being staked out on the lots owned by J. A. Armstrong, on the corner of Main and Maple, which Mr. Armstrong is to erect a modern business block 50x100 feet, plans of which are completed and active work will start soon.

There are several other substantial improvements both in residences and business property under contemplation for Jerome and the coming year will no doubt see one of the largest and most substantial building periods Jerome has ever enjoyed.

MEETING OF TOWN TRUSTEES

The regular meeting of the board of trustees was held Tuesday evening at the town hall. Besides the passing of the usual list of bills several matters of importance were brought before the board. Including a petition from the property owners in blocks 85 and 86 to extend the present fire limit to include these blocks. The matter was referred to a committee. It being the idea of the board to also include lots 75 and 76 when the fire limit is extended.

A. L. Maher was given the contract for redecorating the fire hall. A petition from property owners was presented with reference to the care of East avenue, it being the sense of the meeting that the highway board and the village jointly share the expense of the work.

Ordinance No. 48 referring to automobile traffic was read and on motion same was put on the table for the present.

A committee was appointed to estimate for a bridge on Poplar street crossing the coulee.

Our Main street was a matter of some discussion and on motion Mr. Turner, the highway supervisor, was engaged to do some work on the street at once. Messrs. Anderson, Zug and Tronson were selected as a committee to investigate the matter of forming sidewalk improvement districts, it being desired by several property owners in Jerome to construct sidewalks fronting their residence property, which could be handled cheaper and better through an improvement district.

JEROME COUNTY COURT HOUSE

At the meeting of the county commissioners of Jerome county the matter of quarters for the court house was discussed and after investigating the several propositions put before them the one of Messrs. L'Herrison and Peters appeared the best and a five-year contract was entered into with these gentlemen for rooms over the L'Herrison Furniture company store, where the various officers of the county will be located, except the sheriff, it being the intention of the board to fix and make arrangements with the town to add to the present fire hall rooms suitable for a sheriff's office and a jail. The court room in the L'Herrison-Peters building will be 24x49 feet, and with an addition built onto the building 10x14 for vault purposes the arrangements will be most complete for the county. In the addition to be built on Mr. L'Herrison is arranging for a morgue which will be modern in all respects and which is necessary in his undertaking business.
