T. C. Berry is remodeling his residence.

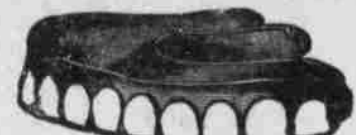
Our school is progressing nicely under Mr. Ruffin's tutelage.
