Resources of the South.

Pittsburg, Sept. 28.—The agricultural resources of the South and the many advantages which that section offers to the homeseeker are going to be made a distinct feature of the National Land and Irrigation Exposition, popularly known as "Pittsburg's Big Land Show," to be held in Pittsburg at Duquesne Garden Oct. 17 to 29, through the exhibit which the Southern Railway Company has arranged to make through its Land and Industrial Department.

This exposition is backed by two of Pittsburg's great daily papers and will be the most comprehensive show of its kind ever held. The "back to the soil" movement has taken deep root in the densely populated district around Pittsburg where farmers are being driven out of their fields by the encroachments of factories, mines and oil wells.

The Land and Industrial Department of the Southern is equipped to make a comprehensive exhibit showing the opportunities that await the settler along its lines in the Southeast and Land and Industrial Agent M. Both were riding on the interurban car when the fuse burned out, and in the darkness an unknown man yelled "car's on fire; jump." The two women jumped from the car before it it stopped. Miss Ball died on the way to the hospital.

Roosevelt and Lake.

Hickman, Ky., Oct. 2.—The naming of the new club at Reelfoot lake for Col. Roosevelt recalls the fact that an earlier Roosevelt was in the neighborhood of West Tennessee when the lake came into being. The older Roosevelt, great-uncle of the ex-President, was the first man to bring a steamboat down the Mississippi river. That was in 1811. As the queer vessel chug-chugged its way southward along the Kentucky and Tennessee shores, spreading terror among the natives, there came the great convulsion in nature known as the earthquake of 1811. The river turned and ran upstream, putting to test the boilers of the little vessel. Land heaved and writhed, changing the bed of the river and the conformation of the river banks. To the east of the plunging vessel the land sunk and a lake formed. This was the famous Reelfoot Lake, and naming the new club for the ex-President has unwittingly re-echoed a bit of history.

Rumor Bank Merger.

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 1.—The board of directors of the Fourth National Bank failed to elect a successor today to President Joe T. Howell, who goes to New York as president of the Carnegie Trust Company. The nominating committee reported ready, but for some reason the directors did not elect. Jas. E. Caldwell, president of the Cumberland Telephone Company, was elected a director and resigned from the directorate of the First National Bank. Rumors that the First and Fourth National will consolidate, with F. O. Watts as president, are rife. The combined institutions would have \$2,000,000 capital and surplus, with \$12,000,000 deposits.
