Niles having expired and a vacancy existing on account of the resignation of C. S. Talley. The result of balloting was the election of C. H. Cobb for three years, Dr. M. A. Blanton for three years and J. L. Fry for one year.

Upon the report of the committee investigating the improvements needed at the City School gymnasium, the board agreed to the recommendations, which were that a total of \$700 is needed, half the amount to be appropriated by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen and the school to raise the other half.
