VERO.

Bean shipments are going forward in
a moderate way and the returns are
fairly satisfactory.

Billy Doctor and two other Indian
chiefs are camped with their tribes just
west of Vero on a hunting expedition.

Mrs. W. H. Wilson's little girl Cecelia
has been very sick for the last few days
but is reported better. It is something
unusual for children to be sick on Indian
River.

At the fish docks everything is very
quiet, moonlight nights, bad weather
etc. have put an entire stop to fishing,
something that has not happened in
Vero for years.

The orange and grapefruit crop from
this point is more than half gone already
and we are thinking if reports are true
that this is the case all over the state
that there will be some who will go with-
out before the season is over.

How is this? N. O. Penny gathered
from one tree planted less than eight
years ago 10 packed boxes of grape-
fruit which at \$2.00 a box the net mar-
ket price at present would make the
crop net \$20.00 deduct \$2.50 for boxes,
picking, packing and delivering to rail-
road, and \$2.50 for fertilizer, work, etc.,
incident to making the crop, would leave
\$15.00 net. Now 100 trees like this can
be grown on an acre which would be
\$1500 for one acre. Of course as heavy
a crop as this cannot be obtained every
year, yet if we make an average of one
half this amount there is good money in
the business. Mr. Penny has several
trees from which he will gather an equal-
ly heavy crop and this is an off year
with his grove.

DESKS OF FAMOUS MEN.

There Are Many of Them Scattered
About the Country.

The desk of Salmon P. Chase, a plain
piece of furniture made from mahog-
any, is in one of the rooms of the treas-
ury department at Washington. There
are many of these old desks scattered
about the country, their chief claim to
interest being that once some well
known man leaned over them.

Alexander Hamilton's traveling desk,
made of mahogany and measuring 12
by 16 inches and 10 inches high, is an
interesting object. Upon this desk was
written much of his literary work, and
the worn green baize with which it is
lined attests to the use to which it was
put. There is a drawer in one side and
several compartments for pens and
ink, while upon the top is inscribed a sil-
ver plate with the name "General Alex-
ander Hamilton" engraved upon it. Within
the top is a strip of parchment
which says, "Given by Mrs. General
Schuyler to her daughter, Mrs. General
A. Hamilton." No doubt the con-
venient size was what recommended it
to the general.

Nathaniel Hawthorne's desk is pre-
served at the custom house, Salem,
Mass. A desk at which he wrote some
of his inimitable romances was just a
board standing out from the wall at an
angle. This is still in the tower room
at Wayside, his home at Concord,
Mass. Victor Hugo had in his Guern-
sey house a study built almost entirely
of glass and perched upon the roof.
Like Hawthorne, he, too, stood at his
writing, and his desk was a mere shelf
fastened by hinges to the wall.—Deline-
ator.
