After reading the bulletin from the Florida Experimental station, published in last issue of THE TRIBUNE, G. E. Dutton calls our attention to results he has obtained from using old pineapple plants as fertilizer, by digging them well into the soil. He tried their use on top of the sand hill in the north end of town. His finest pineapple plants are growing where the old plants were buried; and in addition, he reserved a part of the land thus treated as a vegetable garden, and on it has produced cucumbers, the vines reaching a spread of twelve feet; eggplant, standing three feet high and touching in rows three feet apart, and he is now shipping beans raised on the sand ridge, that not only present a splendid appearance, but are yielding bountifully. Mr. Dutton has his garden well irrigated, and believes that he will engage in gardening under shed another winter, and will certainly use his old pineapple plants as fertilizer.
