State Health Dept. Will Exhibit Here

Have Planned For A Large Exhibi-
tion At The Pocomoke Fair
Next Week.

The State Department of Health, the Maryland Social Hygiene Society, the American Child Hygiene Organization and the Maryland Tuberculosis Association, with other agencies interested in public health, are planning a large exhibit for the Pocomoke Fair. This exhibit will be housed in six large tents, and will contain hundreds of interesting posters and demonstrations. Two moving picture shows will be operated continuously all day and the films will be changed every day. Specially prepared pamphlets containing instructions on how to prevent diseases and health will be distributed.

On Wednesday, August 17, the mo-

tion pictures will be on Child Welfare, on Thursday Tuberculosis, and on Friday Social Hygiene. Each day a special lecturer of state or national prominence will be present to explain the pictures and to talk to the audience.

The germs that cause diseases, magnified thousands of times, will be shown with the aid of microscopes and the ways to avoid them will be explained.

No charge will be made for admission to this exhibit and everybody is invited to attend as many times as they wish.

Thursday next, August 18th, will be "Tag Day" for the Junior Aid Society of Salem M. E. Church and it is hoped that everyone will wear a tag on that day.
