SPECIAL SCHOOL MEETING.—There will be a special meeting of the voters of the Red Wing School District, at the District School House on Friday evening April 15th for the purpose of voting upon the proposition to levy a tax to buy a school site and to build a school house.

CITY ELECTION.—The caucus last Saturday evening to nominate city officers was largely attended, and nearly unanimous. About one hundred and eighty votes were cast on the nomination of some of the candidates, which shows the general interest felt in the spring election. Some who were not nominated complain that it was a firemen's nomination. There were not to exceed forty firemen in the Court House, and if enough other citizens voted with them for the candidates of their choice, it shows the wisdom of the choice. The firemen were numerically in a small minority, yet they do not complain of the nominations, and why should the majority who had things all their own way complain?

COUNTY POOR.—It is very evident that our county should have a suitable place for the keeping of the unfortunate poor, who are found in our community. By a suitable place we mean an asylum, with sufficient land susceptible of cultivation to make it a paying institution, thereby relieving the citizens at large of the burden of keeping the poor of the county at public expense. Such an institution can in a few years be made to pay its own way and put money into the county treasury. As a measure of economy and humanity, we hope Goodhue county will not long be without an asylum and farm for the poor.—*Republican.*

ROADS.—A new City Council has been elected, and by the new charter under which they serve, they are vested with full power over all the roads within the township. The people in the city and in the country want and demand that we shall have better roads, and that demand must not be slighted. The commercial interest of the city requires good roads more than any other thing. We could as well do without the Mississippi river as we can do without roads.

There is but one feasible route out of this city, and that route must be adopted. It will finally be adopted, and we might as well do it now, as to waste a few thousand more dollars on the boggy and sand hills, and then after all have to abandon them with the total loss of all the money expended upon them. That route is as we indicated last week; go out on East Avenue, past the Pucker farm, leaving the old Cannon Falls road just beyond sand hill, and cross Hay Creek at the mouth of Trout Brook. To go to Mantoville, or any place in that direction, pursue the same route until within forty rods of Hay Creek, then turn to the left and go up the creek. From Pardee's to Mr. Heriberto's road has already been laid out and opened, and from Heriberto's to the place indicated it is not more than half a mile, and the land perfectly level. By following this route we avoid the sand hill beyond Brownson's, and Hay Creek bottom on that road, and we avoid on the other road the tremendous hills between here and Mr. Pardee's, without lengthening the distance. It is impossible for us to conceive why this route has been so long neglected, and such impassable ones adopted.
