Bonus System in Japan.

The highest salaried man in Japan does not receive enough money in that form to pay for gasoline used by his automobile, for salaries of the managers of business corporations are insignificantly small, says the Japan Times. Salaries, however, are not the total income of business men. Under the Japanese custom there is a liberal bonus system, and the bonus amounts to 300 or 400 times the monthly salary in some cases.

The Mitsui company is regarded as the biggest corporation in Japan and their directors are noted for their large incomes. Each director is said to receive in the form of a bonus about \$100,000 a year, although his salary may be only \$250 a month.

OPPORTUNITIES THAT ARE MISSED

Why Wait? Why Not Go to West-
ern Canada Now?

The writer has frequently heard the remark that "after the war we will go to Western Canada." It does not occur to those making the remark that if they wish to secure lands in Western Canada, whether by homestead or purchase, the best time to go is now. After the war the welcome will be just as hearty as ever, but the chances are that land values will increase and to-day homesteads are plentiful and land is reasonable in price. There is no question about what the land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta will do, what it will give under proper cultivation.

Farmers in Western Canada are paying for their land holdings with the proceeds of last year's crop. That this is no idle statement may be gleaned from the three following items, which are picked out at random:

"In the spring of 1916 a half-section of land was offered for sale at \$17.00 per acre. There were 105 acres of summer-fallow, which because the owner could not at the time find a buyer, were seeded to wheat. A yield of 40 bushels per acre, 4,200 bushels all told, grading No. 1, was obtained. The price the day the grain was sold (which was very early in the season before grain prices advanced to round about \$2.00) was \$1.60, which brought the handsome total of \$6,720.00. Three hundred and twenty acres at \$17.00 equals \$5,440.00, so that a buyer, by placing less than half of the whole under crop, would have made a profit of \$1,280.00."—Robson Messenger, Robson, Sask.

"That the Indiana Boys' farm this year raised sufficient crop to pay for the land, all the machinery and all overhead expenses as well as make a handsome profit, is the information given by N. B. Davis, the manager. The wheat yield was over 22,000 bushels. Of twelve cars already sold, nine graded No. 1, and Mr. Davis has sold over 2,000 bushels locally for seed at \$2.00. Naturally, when he gets to Indiana he will be a big booster for Alberta."—Bassano Mail, Bassano, Alta.

"Oscar Castalar, who bought land at Blusson after the crop had been put in last spring, for \$3,800.00, has threshed 3,000 bushels of wheat, which is worth at present prices about \$7,500.00. He refused an offer of \$5,000.00 for the land after the crop had been taken off."—Lethbridge Herald, Lethbridge, Alta.

Reports from the wheat fields are highly encouraging and show that the wheat crop of many farmers in Western Canada was highly satisfactory. Coblenz, Sask.—W. A. Rose has threshed an average of 33 bushels per acre and 83 bushels of oats. Gleichen, Alberta.—Up to date 237,812 bushels of grain have been received by local elevators, of which nearly 180,000 bushels were wheat. Seventy-one cars of grain have already been shipped.

LOVE THRIVES ON EUGENICS

Marriages in Milwaukee Are on the Increase Despite Law Against Unfit.

Marriage goes merrily on in Milwaukee, regardless of the eugenics law, says the Sentinel of that city. Figures in the county clerk's office show an increase in both 1915 and 1916 over 1914 in the number of licenses issued. The eugenics law, in operation for three years, has had no effect upon the celebration of the time-honored nuptials.

"I still maintain that the eugenics law has been of tremendous benefit to the people of the state," declared Mrs. G. A. Hipke, sponsor for the law. "It is asserted that doctors make only superficial tests of men who come to them for examination before marriage, but I contend that no conscientious physician could pass upon a case which might later bring results that would reflect upon his earlier judgment."

Mrs. Hipke declared that, while she had no present intention of agitating any change in the law she might consider a broadening of the law that would include the women as well as the men in the prenuptial examination.

Songs Inspire Shower of Crockery. Street singing is an especially Neapolitan institution, and when for the first time one hears beneath his windows the more often than not off-key versions of the snappy, lifting, inexpressibly infectious Neapolitan songs he is enchanted and throws pennies freely. Happenings of the World Tersely Told

European War News

The Petrograd war office announced the recapture of the village of Vadeni in Roumania, six miles southwest of the Danube town of Galatz.

Eight British and two French vessels have been sunk in the Atlantic, and two British steamships captured by a German raider. Announcement to this effect was made by the British admiralty at London.

Russian forces undertook a violent attack in Roumania on both sides of Fumendi. The war office report from Berlin says the advancing Russian waves were cut down by the German fire, which inflicted great losses.

The allied army on the Saloniki front will be re-enforced as a preliminary effort to cut the Berlin-Constantinople railroad, according to a dispatch to London from a British correspondent with General Sarraill's forces.

The Belgian relief ship Samland, which docked at New York, was held up 400 miles off the Irish coast by the German commerce raider Moldavia. The Samland was allowed to proceed because she carried supplies consigned to the American commission for relief in Belgium.

The presence in Greece of Gen. von Falkenhayn, former German chief of staff and recently in command of part of the forces engaged in the campaign against Roumania, is reported in French official quarters at Saloniki, according to a Reuter dispatch to London from that point.

The sinking of the Austrian passenger steamship Zagreb, 537 tons gross, by a submarine in the Adriatic on January 14, with the loss of 26 lives, is reported in a telegram to London from Vienna to Amsterdam, as forwarded in a Reuter dispatch. The Zagreb is reported to have been torpedoed without warning off the coast of central Dalmatia.

Mexican War News

Six Mexicans were killed by two American cowboys, 30 miles west of Nogales, Ariz., when they were fired upon while herding back cattle "rusted" by the Mexicans.

The Mexican-American joint commission, which failed to effect an adjustment of the questions at issue between Mexico and the United States after a series of conferences that began four months ago, was formally dissolved at New York. The American commission told the Mexicans that they had recommended to the president the dispatch to Mexico of Ambassador Fletcher and the withdrawal of the American troops from Chihuahua.

The Villa chief, Zeferino Moreno, and 60 followers were killed in the fight at Pilar de Conchos, Mex., according to details of that action received at Chihuahua City from Gen. Pablo Gonzales.

Domestic

Joe Layton and Frank Carter, deputies, were shot while attempting to take suspects of the Harrah bank robbery who had been cornered in a house southeast of Harrah, Okla.

A district court grand jury indictment made public at Corning, Ia., is against Swift & Co., packers, who are charged with discrimination in the purchase of poultry. It is alleged that higher prices were paid by its agents at Prescott, Ia., than were paid at Corning upon the same day. Competition, it is said, is greater at Prescott than at Corning.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was in conference at New York with David L. Fultz, president of the Baseball Players' fraternity. After the meeting Mr. Gompers said, when asked if the players' federation had joined the labor organization, "No, not yet, but soon."

H. Grady Webb, a student at the Kansas City Medical college, was arrested at Kansas City, Mo., charged with taking part in the daring robbery of a Baltimore & Ohio train near Doddridge, W. Va., October 8, 1915, when \$100,000 in unsigned currency was stolen. Webb confessed, according to the police.

Chicago's bill regulation of 1911, prohibiting billboards on residence streets without consent of more than half of the property owners, was upheld as constitutional by the Supreme court at Washington in the Thomas Cusack company's suits against the city.

President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor told the house commerce committee at Washington that if any legislation to make a strike unlawful were enacted he, for one, could be counted upon as one of those who would violate it.

Physicians at the hospital in Philadelphia where Harry K. Thaw, who attempted to commit suicide last week by slashing himself with a razor, is a patient, said that Thaw was not recovering as rapidly as had been expected and expressed concern both as to his mental and physical condition.

Weldon H. Wells, former Kansas City brokers' clerk, confessed to County Prosecutor R. P. Duncan at Columbus, O., that he shot and killed Mona Byron Simon in a room in a hotel. His statement, according to the authorities, says he killed the girl in self-defense. Wells was arrested in Huntington, Ind.

Personal

Admiral George Dewey, who won the naval battle at Manila bay, died at his home in Washington, at the age of seventy-nine, after an illness lasting six days. Admiral Dewey's illness was diagnosed as arterio sclerosis. Dewey was born at Montpelier, Vt., on December 27, 1837.

Washington

The president sent a special message to congress at Washington formally announcing the death of Admiral Dewey and paying tribute to the dead naval hero, by saying that "the people and the government of the United States will always rejoice to perpetuate his name in all honor and affection."

The United States government at Washington has been forced to go to England to secure its 16 and 14-inch shells for the navy. The navy department awarded to Hatfields, Limited, of London, contracts for 3,000 16-inch shells, at \$514 each, and 4,500 14-inch shells, at \$350 each, delivery in 16 months.

The entente allies, in a note addressed by Arthur Balfour, foreign minister, to Ambassador Spring-Rice, and delivered to the state department at Washington, amplify their reply to President Wilson's peace note, by explaining in detail why they believe it impossible at present to attain peace which will assure them such guarantees as they consider essential.

Sovereignty over the Danish West Indies, after half a century of negotiation, passed to the United States with the exchange of ratifications of the purchase treaty by Secretary Lansing and Danish Minister Brun at Washington.

Indorsement by the Vatican of President Wilson's peace efforts was transmitted to the president at Washington, as the administration sought to work out the next move in the peace negotiations.

The house ways and means committee at Washington agreed on the plan for raising sufficient money to pay the government's bills. Special taxes will be provided to raise \$236,000,000 and bonds will be issued to the extent of \$219,000,000.

Thomas W. Lawson, called before the house rules committee at Washington to tell what he knew or had heard about a stock market leak on President Wilson's peace note or be punished, declared that the mysterious congressman who told him a cabinet officer, a senator and a banker were engaged in a stock gambling pool was none other than Representative Henry, chairman of the committee. Then, he declared, that the cabinet officer referred to was Secretary McAdoo; that the banker was H. Piny Fiske of New York, and that he knew the senator only by the initial "O." All of the men that he named denied the charges.

The federal white slave law was construed by the Supreme court at Washington to prohibit interstate transportation of women for any immoral purpose, including private escapades as well as commercialized vice. In three test cases the court in a divided opinion affirmed convictions of F. Drew Caminetti and Maury I. Diggs and L. T. Hays.

The United States Chamber of Commerce reports at Washington that a referendum taken by it shows that the business interests of the country are in favor of combinations to conserve natural resources.

Possible renewal of last year's fight over warning Americans off armed ships was presaged when Representative Cary, Milwaukee, introduced a joint resolution in the house at Washington calling for such a warning to be issued.

In a peculiar "tie" decision which lawyers say has never had a parallel the Supreme court at Washington decided the railway mail "divisor" case. Involving payment to railroads of more than \$46,000,000, adversely to the Chicago & Alton and the Yazoo & Mississippi Valley railroads, affirming the decision in the court of claims.

Foreign

The food situation in Germany has become much worse in the last six months, according to the account of a correspondent who has returned to Stockholm from a trip to Berlin.

King Constantine of Greece, the brother-in-law and would-be ally of the kaiser, is to be deposed and a relative of the king of Italy placed on his throne, it is understood at Rome.
